


# Bhutan Standard Classification Of Occupations



#### PREFACE

The National Statistics Bureau (NSB) as the apex body for coordination of statistical activities is mandated to provide timely and reliable statistics for evidence-based planning and monitoring. The NSB is also responsible for development of statistical standards in line with international standards for collection, compilation and dissemination of official statistics. The Bhutan Standard Classification of Occupations (BSCO) is developed in its effort to coordinate and harmonize statistical activities in the country and to maintain statistical standards in terms of occupations.

The BSCO 2022 will be used in coding of all occupations for statistical purposes. The adoption and use of these standards in the collection, analysis and dissemination of statistics will ensure consistency and comparability of data, facilitating meaningful analysis and usage. The BSCO 2022 adopted the basic framework and principles of the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO) developed by the International Labour Office (ILO). To facilitate better understanding and appropriate use of the classification, detailed write-up is provided at the unit group (four-digit) level.

The BSCO 2022 will be reviewed and updated periodically to reflect developments in the labour market, particularly the emergence of new occupations as well as to align with changes in the international standard. We are hopeful that this document will be helpful and will be extensively used for occupation coding by the statistical fraternity.

# I. BACKGROUND

The Bhutan Standard Classification of Occupations (BSCO 2022) provides a system for classifying and aggregating occupational information in line with International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO). It is developed based on the ISCO-08 to ensure international comparability. ISCO-08 is a four level structured classification that allows all jobs in the world to be classified into 436 unit groups. It is further aggregated into 130 minor groups, 43 sub-major groups and 10 major groups based on their similarity of skill required for jobs.

BSCO 2022 classifies the occupations according to the type of work performed and provides greater clarity in the descriptions of unit groups (four-digit) and occupations (five-digit) in the national context for the collection and dissemination of statistics from sources such as population census, labour force surveys and other surveys.

These groups form the most detailed level of the classification structure and are aggregated based on their similarity in terms of the skill level and skill specialization required for the jobs but not on the position rankings of the jobs or qualifications of an employee. The BSCO is not a framework for administrative regulation of occupations that concerns the legal or regulatory status of any occupational group.

# 1.1 Conceptual framework scope

The framework used for the design and construction is based on two main concepts: the concept of job and the concept of skill.

#### Definitions of job and occupation

- A job is defined as a "set of tasks and duties performed, or meant to be performed, by one person, including for an employer or in self-employment".
- Occupation refers to the kind of work performed in a job. The concept of occupation is defined as a set of jobs whose main task and duties are characterized by a high degree of similarity".

**Work:** According to ILO standards and United Nations 1993 System of National Accounts, work includes any kind of work or business such as collecting water or firewood, cow herding, tailoring, or making mats, etc. for the households.

# 1.2 Skill level and Skill Specialization

- Skill is defined as the ability to carry out the task and duties of a given job. Two dimensions of skills are used to arrange occupations in a group. These are skill level and skill specialization.
- Skill level defined as a function of the complexity and range of tasks and duties to be performed in an occupation.
- Skill level is measured operationally by considering one or more of:
- The nature of the work performed in an occupation in relation to the characteristics tasks and duties defined for each skill level;
- The level of formal education defined in terms of ISC of Education required for competent performance of the tasks and duties involved; and
- The amount of informal on-the-job training and /or previous experience in a related occupation required for competent performance of these tasks and duties.

# Skill specialization is considered in terms of four concepts;

- the field of knowledge required;
- the tools and machinery used;
- the materials worked on or with; and
- the kinds of goods and services produced.

# Skill level – 1

Many occupations at skill level 1 may require physical strength and or endurance, simple and routine physical or manual tasks. Completion of primary education or first stage of basic education

# Skill level – 2

Ability to read information such as safety instructions, to make written records of work completed, and accurately perform simple arithmetic calculations is essential. Involve in the performance of tasks such as operating machinery and electronic equipment; driving vehicles, maintenance and repair of electrical and mechanical equipment.

# Skill level – 3

Occupation at this skill level generally requires a high level of literacy and numeracy and well-developed interpersonal communication skills. Completion of higher secondary education and 1 -3 years of on-job training.

# Skill level – 4

Involve the performance of tasks that require complex problem-solving, decision-making

and creativity based on an extensive body of theoretical and factual knowledge in a specialized field.

# **II. PURPOSE AND SCOPE OF THE CLASSIFICATION**

The Bhutan Standard Classification for Occupation(BSCO) is a standard classification of the aggregated occupations in the country. It provides a system for classifying and aggregating occupational information obtained from censuses, surveys and administrative data collections. The main objectives of the BSCO is to standardize the occupation classification in the country to have both nationally and internationally comparable occupational data for the statistical purposes. The national classification is based on ISCO-08 by providing more detailed occupational groups at the fifth hierarchical level.

The BSCO maintained the consistency with the structure of the ISCO with extension to five-digit level by further subdividing the unit groups for easy referencing. The skills level and skill specialization required for the jobs were the main criteria used in defining the sub-unit groups (five-digit level) of the present edition of BSCO. The "occupation" is the statistical unit of the classification. Occupation refers to the kind of work performed in a job. The concept of occupation is defined as a set of jobs whose main task and duties are characterized by a high degree of similarity".

# **III. BHUTAN STANDARD CLASSIFICATION OF OCCUPATIONS (BSCO) 2022.**

The National Statistics Bureau (NSB), a custodian for collection, compilation and dissemination of all official statistics in the country is also responsible for development of statistical standards in the country and encourage its compliance. The NSB initiated the task of developing a national occupation classification with the support of various relevant government agencies. The first version of Bhutan Standard Classification of Occupations intends to provide a basis for the collection, compilation and dissemination of standard occupational statistics for Bhutan. The BSCO can assist the government agencies, researchers and other data users for evidence based decision making, planning and research purposes.

# IV. STRUCTURE OF BHUTAN STANDARD CLASSIFICATION OF OCCUPATIONS (BSCO) 2022.

The BSCO 2022 is structured as follows:

The BSCO is a five-digit level structured classification that allows all jobs in the world to be classified into 797 sub-unit groups and 436 unit groups. It is further aggregated into 130 minor groups, 43 sub-major groups and 10 major groups based on their similarity of skill required for jobs. These groups form the most detailed level of the classification structure and are aggregated based on their similarity in terms of the skill level and skill specialization required for the jobs.

#### **Description of Major Groups**

#### 1. Managers

Managers plan, direct, coordinate and evaluate the overall activities of enterprises, governments and other organizations, or of all units, and formulate and review the policies, laws, rules and regulations.

#### Tasks include:

- formulating and advising on the policy, budgets, laws and regulations of enterprises, governments and other organizational units;
- establishing objectives and standards and formulating and evaluating programmes and policies and procedures for implementation;
- ensuring appropriate systems and procedures are developed and implemented to provide budgetary control; authorizing material, human and financial resources to implement policies and programmes;
- monitoring and evaluating performance of the organization or enterprise and of its staff; selecting, or approving the selection of staff; ensuring compliance with health and safety requirements;
- planning and directing daily operations; representing and negotiating on behalf of the government, enterprise or organizational unit managed in meetings and other forums.

#### 2. Professionals

Professionals increase the existing stock of knowledge; apply scientific or artistic concepts and theories; teach about the foregoing in a systematic manner; or engage in any combination of these activities.

#### Tasks include:

• Conducting analysis and research, and developing concepts, theories and

operational methods, and advising on or applying existing knowledge related to physical sciences including mathematics, engineering and technology, and to life sciences including the medical and health services, as well as to social sciences and humanities;

- teaching the theory and practice of one or more disciplines at different educational levels; teaching and educating handicapped persons;
- providing various business, legal and social services;
- creating and performing works of art;
- providing spiritual guidance;
- preparing scientific papers and reports;
- supervision of other workers may be included.

# 3. Associate Professionals and Technicians

Associate professionals and technicians perform mostly technical and related tasks connected with research and the application of scientific or artistic concepts and operational methods, and government or business regulations.

# Tasks include:

- undertaking and carrying out technical work connected with research and the application of concepts and operational methods in the fields of physical sciences including engineering and technology, life sciences including the medical profession, and social sciences and humanities;
- initiating and carrying out various technical services related to trade, finance, administration, including administration of government laws and regulations, and to social work;
- providing technical support for the arts and entertainment participating in sporting activities; executing some religious tasks;
- supervision of other workers may be included.

# 4. Clerical Support Workers

Clerical support workers record, organize, store, compute and retrieve information, and perform a number of clerical duties in connection with money-handling operations, travel arrangements, requests for information, and appointments.

- stenography, typing, and operating word processors and other office machines;
- entering data into computers;

- carrying out secretarial duties;
- recording and computing numerical data;
- keeping records relating to stocks, production and transport;
- keeping records relating to passenger and freight transport;
- carrying out clerical duties in libraries;
- filing documents;
- · carrying out duties in connection with mail services;
- preparing and checking materials for printing;
- assisting persons who cannot read or write with correspondence;
- performing money-handling operations;
- dealing with travel arrangements;
- supplying information requested by clients and making appointments;
- operating a telephone switchboard.

#### 5. Services and sales workers

Services and sales workers provide personal and protective services related to travel, housekeeping, catering, personal care, protection against fire and unlawful acts; or demonstrate and sell goods in wholesale or retail shops and similar establishments, as well as at stalls and on markets.

- organizing and providing services during travel;
- housekeeping; preparing and serving of food and beverages;
- caring for children; personal and basic health care at home or in institutions, as well as hairdressing, beauty treatment and companionship;
- telling fortunes; embalming and arranging funerals;
- providing security services and protecting individuals and property against fire and un lawful acts;
- enforcing of law and order;
- posing as models for adverting, artistic creation and display of goods;
- selling goods in wholesale or retail establishments, as well as at stalls and on
- markets;
- demonstrating goods to potential customers.

# 6. Skilled Agricultural, Forestry and Fishery Workers

Skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers grow and harvest field or tree and shrub crops; gather wild fruits and plants; breed or tend; produce a variety of animals husbandry products; cultivate, conserve and exploits forests; and breed fish in order to provide food, shelter and income for themselves and their households.

# Tasks include:

- preparing the soil; sowing, planting, spraying, fertilizing and harvesting field crops;
- growing fruit and other tree and shrub crops;
- growing garden vegetables and horticultural products;
- gathering wilds fruits and plants;
- breeding, raising, tending animals mainly to obtain meat, milk, hair, fur, skin or sericultural, apiarian or other products;
- cultivating, conserving and exploiting forests;
- breeding or selling fish;
- storing and carrying out some basic processing of their produce;
- selling their products to purchasers, marketing organizations or at markets.

# 7. Craft and Related Trades Workers

Craft and related trades workers apply specific technical and practical knowledge and skills to construct and maintain buildings; form metal; erect metal structures; set machine tools or make, fit, maintain and repair machinery, equipment or tools; carry out printing work; and produce or process foodstuffs, textiles and wooden, metal and other articles, including handicraft goods.

- constructing, maintaining and repairing buildings and other structures;
- casting, welding and shaping metal;
- installing and erecting heavy metal structures, tackle and related equipment;
- making machinery, tools, equipment and other metal articles;
- setting for operators, or setting and operating various machine tools;
- fitting, maintaining and repairing industrial machinery, engines, vehicles, electrical and electronic instruments and other equipment;
- making precision instrument, jewellery, household and other precious metal articles, pottery, glass and related products;

- producing handicrafts; executing printing work;
- producing and processing foodstuffs and various articles made of wood, textiles, leather and related materials.

#### 8. Plant and Machine Operators and Assemblers

Plant and machine operators and assemblers operate and monitor industrial and agricultural machinery and equipment on the spot or by remote control; drive and operate motor vehicles and mobile machinery and equipment; or assemble products from component parts according to strict specifications and procedures.

#### Tasks include:

- operating and monitoring mining or other industrial machinery and equipment for processing metal, minerals, glass, ceramics, woods, paper or chemical;
- operating and monitoring machinery and equipment used to produce articles made of metal, minerals, chemicals, rubber, plastics, wood, paper, textiles, fur or leather, and which process foodstuffs and related products;
- driving and operating motors vehicles;
- driving, operating and monitoring mobile industrial and agricultural machinery and equipment;
- assembling products from component parts according to strict specifications and procedures.

#### 9. Elementary Occupations

Elementary occupations involve the performance of simple and routine tasks which may require the use of handheld tools and considerable physical effort.

- cleaning, restocking supplies and performing basic maintenance in apartments, houses, kitchens, hotels, offices and other buildings;
- washing cars and windows;
- helping in kitchens and performing simple tasks in food preparation;
- delivering messages or goods;
- carrying luggage and handling baggage and freight;
- collecting and sorting refuse;
- sweeping streets and similar places;
- performing various simple farming and fishing tasks;
- performing simple tasks connected with mining, construction and manufacturing

including product-sorting;

- packing and unpacking produce by hand, and filling shelves;
- providing various street services.

#### 10. Armed Forces Occupations

Armed forces occupations include all jobs held by members of the armed forces. Members of the armed forces are those personnel who are currently serving in the armed forces, including auxiliary services, whether on a voluntary or compulsory basis, and who are not free to accept civilian employment and are subject to military discipline. Included are regular members of the army and other military services, as well as conscripts enrolled for military training or other service for a specified period.
