In addition, this version also introduces an Occupational Coding Index, which provides

a comprehensive list of jobs categorised under the same code for greater clarity and ease of use. The index will be regularly updated to reflect the evolving labour market trends in Bhutan while maintaining alignment with international standards.

We hope that this version will help enhance the quality of occupational and employment data for informed decision-making in the country, whether the data used is from administrative records, surveys, or censuses.

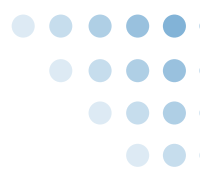

I. BACKGROUND

The Bhutan Standard Classification of Occupations (BSCO 2022)- Version 2 provides a system for classifying and aggregating occupational information in line with the International Standard Classification of Occupations (ISCO). It is developed based on the ISCO-08 to ensure international comparability. ISCO-08 is a four-level structured classification that allows all jobs in the world to be classified into 436-unit groups. It is further aggregated into 130 minor groups, 43 sub-major groups and 10 major groups based on their similarity of skills required for jobs.

BSCO 2022-Version 2 classifies the occupations according to the type of work performed. It provides greater clarity in the descriptions of unit groups (four-digit) and occupations (five-digit) in the national context for the collection and dissemination of statistics from sources such as population census, labour force surveys and other surveys.

These groups form the most detailed level of the classification structure and are aggregated based on their similarity in terms of the skill level and skill specialisation required for the jobs but not on the position rankings of the jobs or qualifications of an employee. The BSCO is not a framework for administrative regulation of occupations that concerns the legal or regulatory status of any occupational group.

1.1 Conceptual framework scope

The framework used for the design and construction is based on two main concepts: the concept of job and the concept of skill.

Definitions of job and occupation

- A job is defined as a “set of tasks and duties performed, or meant to be performed, by one person, including for an employer or in self-employment”.
- Occupation refers to the kind of work performed in a job. The concept of occupation is defined as a set of jobs whose main task and duties are characterised by a high degree of similarity.

Work: According to ILO standards and the United Nations 1993 System of National Accounts, work includes any kind of work or business, such as collecting water or firewood, cow herding, tailoring, or making mats, etc., for households.

1.2 Skill level and Skill Specialization

- Skill is defined as the ability to carry out the tasks and duties of a given job. Two dimensions of skills are used to arrange occupations in a group. These are skill level and skill specialisation.
- Skill level is defined as a function of

the complexity and range of tasks and duties to be performed in an occupation.

- Skill level is measured operationally by considering one or more of the following:
- The nature of the work performed in an occupation about the characteristics of tasks and duties defined for each skill level;
- The level of formal education defined in terms of ISC of Education required for competent performance of the tasks and duties involved and
- The amount of informal on-the-job training and /or previous experience in a related occupation required for competent performance of these tasks and duties.

Skill specialization is considered in terms of four concepts;

- the field of knowledge required;
- the tools and machinery used;
- the materials worked on or with, and
- The kinds of goods and services produced.

Skill level – 1

Many occupations at skill level 1 may require physical strength and/or endurance, simple and routine physical or manual tasks. Completion of primary education or first stage of basic education.

Skill level – 2

The ability to read information such as safety instructions, to make written records of work completed, and to accurately perform simple

arithmetic calculations is essential. Involve in the performance of tasks such as operating machinery and electronic equipment, driving vehicles, maintenance and repair of electrical and mechanical equipment.

Skill level – 3


Occupation at this skill level generally requires a high level of literacy and numeracy and well-developed interpersonal communication skills. Completion of higher secondary education and 1 -3 years of on-the-job training.

Skill level – 4

Involve the performance of tasks that require complex problem-solving, decision-making and creativity based on an extensive body of theoretical and factual knowledge in a specialised field

II. PURPOSE AND SCOPE OF THE CLASSIFICATION

The Bhutan Standard Classification for Occupation (BSCO) - Version 2 is a standard classification of the aggregated occupations in the country. It provides a system for classifying and aggregating occupational information obtained from censuses, surveys, and administrative data collections. The main objective of the BSCO is to standardise the occupation classification in the country to have both nationally and internationally comparable occupational data for statistical purposes. The national classification is based on ISCO-08 by providing more detailed occupational groups at the fifth hierarchical level.



The BSCO maintains consistency with the structure of the ISCO with an extension to a five-digit level by further subdividing the unit groups for easy referencing. The skill level and skill specialisation required for the jobs were the main criteria used in defining the sub-unit groups (five-digit level) of the present edition of BSCO. The occupation is the statistical unit of the classification. Occupation refers to the kind of work performed in a job. The concept of occupation is defined as a set of jobs whose main task and duties are characterised by a high degree of similarity.

III. BHUTAN STANDARD CLASSIFICATION OF OCCUPATIONS (BSCO) 2022-VERSION 2

The National Statistics Bureau (NSB), a custodian for the collection, compilation, and dissemination of all official statistics in the country, is also responsible for the development of statistical standards in the country and encourages its compliance. The NSB initiated the task of developing a national occupation classification with the support of various relevant government agencies. The first version of the Bhutan Standard Classification of Occupations provided a basis for the collection, compilation, and dissemination of standard occupational statistics for Bhutan. The updated version of BSCO 2022 provides a detailed description of occupations at the five-digit level along with an occupational coding index.

The Occupational Coding Index provides a list of all possible jobs classified under the same occupation codes. The occupational coding index will be regularly updated to cover all relevant occupations in the labour market. The updated BSCO shall assist government agencies, researchers, and other data users for evidence-based decision-making, planning, and research purposes.

IV. STRUCTURE OF BHUTAN STANDARD CLASSIFICATION OF OCCUPATIONS (BSCO) 2022-VERSION 2.

The BSCO 2022 is structured as follows:

The BSCO is a five-digit level structured classification that allows all jobs in the world to be classified into 753 sub-unit groups and 435-unit groups. It is further aggregated into 130 minor groups, 43 sub-major groups and 10 major groups based on their similarity of skills required for jobs. These groups form the most detailed level of the classification structure and are aggregated based on their similarity in terms of the skill level and skill specialisation required for the jobs.

Description of Major Groups

1. Managers

Managers plan, direct, coordinate and evaluate the overall activities of enterprises, governments and other organisations or all units and formulate and review the Policies, laws, rules and regulations.

Tasks include:

- Formulating and advising on the policy, budgets, laws and regulations of enterprises, governments and other organisational units;
- Establishing objectives and standards and formulating and evaluating programme policies and procedures for implementation;
- Ensuring appropriate systems and procedures are developed and implemented to provide budgetary control; authorising material, human and financial resources to implement policies and programmes;
- Monitoring and evaluating the performance of the organisation or enterprise and its staff; selecting or approving the selection of staff; ensuring compliance with health and safety requirements;
- Planning and directing daily operations; representing and negotiating on

behalf of the government, enterprise or organisational unit managed in meetings and other forums.

2. Professionals

Professionals increase the existing stock of knowledge, apply scientific or artistic concepts and theories, teach about the foregoing systematically, or engage in any combination of these activities.

Tasks include:

- Conducting analysis and research, developing concepts, theories and operational methods, and advising on or applying existing knowledge related to physical sciences, including mathematics, engineering and technology, and to life sciences, including the medical and health services, as well as to social sciences and humanities;
- Teaching the theory and practice of one or more disciplines at different educational levels; teaching and educating handicapped persons;
- Providing various business, legal and social services;
- Creating and performing works of art;
- Providing spiritual guidance;
- Preparing scientific papers and reports;
- Supervision of other workers may be included.

3. Associate Professionals and Technicians

Associate professionals and technicians perform mostly technical and related tasks connected with research, the application



of scientific or artistic concepts and operational methods, and government or business regulations.

Tasks include:

- Undertaking and carrying out technical work connected with research and the application of concepts and operational methods in the fields of physical sciences, including engineering and technology; life sciences, including the medical profession, and social sciences and humanities;
- Initiating and carrying out various technical services related to trade, finance, and administration, including administration of government laws and regulations and social work;
- Providing technical support for the arts and entertainment, participating in sporting activities, and executing some religious tasks;
- Supervision of other workers may be included.

4. Clerical Support Workers

Clerical support workers record, organise, store, compute and retrieve information and perform several clerical duties in connection with money-handling operations, travel arrangements, requests for information, and appointments.

Tasks include:

- Stenography, typing, and operating word processors and other office machines;
- Entering data into computers;
- Carrying out secretarial duties;

- Recording and computing numerical data;
- Keeping records relating to stocks, production and transport;
- Keeping records relating to passenger and freight transport;
- Carrying out clerical duties in libraries;
- Filing documents;
- Carrying out duties in connection with mail services;
- Preparing and checking materials for printing;
- Assisting persons who cannot read or write with correspondence;
- Performing money-handling operations;
- Dealing with travel arrangements;
- Supplying the information requested by clients and making appointments;
- Operating a telephone switchboard.

5. Services and sales workers

Services and sales workers provide personal and protective services related to travel, housekeeping, catering, personal care, and protection against fire and unlawful acts or demonstrate and sell goods in wholesale or retail shops and similar establishments, as well as at stalls and on markets.

Tasks include:

- Organising and providing services during travel;
- Housekeeping; preparing and serving of food and beverages;
- Caring for children; personal and basic health care at home or in institutions, as well as hairdressing, beauty treatment and companionship;

- Telling fortunes, embalming and arranging funerals;
- Providing security services and protecting individuals and property against fire and unlawful acts;
- Enforcing of law and order;
- Posing as models for advertising, artistic creation and display of goods;
- Selling goods in wholesale or retail establishments, as well as at stalls and on markets;
- Demonstrating goods to potential customers.

6. Skilled Agricultural, Forestry and Fishery Workers

Skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers grow and harvest field or tree and shrub crops; gather wild fruits and plants; breed or tend; produce a variety of animal husbandry products; cultivate, conserve and exploit forests; and breed fish to provide food, shelter and income for themselves and their households.

Tasks include:

- Preparing the soil; sowing, planting, spraying, fertilising and harvesting field crops;
- Growing fruit and other tree and shrub crops;
- Growing garden vegetables and horticultural products;
- Gathering wild fruits and plants;
- Breeding, raising, and tending animals mainly to obtain meat, milk, hair, fur, skin or sericulture, apiculture or other products;
- Cultivating, conserving and exploiting forests;

- Breeding or selling fish;
- Storing and carrying out some basic processing of their produce;
- Selling their products to purchasers, marketing organisations or at markets.

7. Craft and Related Trades Workers

Craft and related trades workers apply specific technical and practical knowledge and skills to construct and maintain buildings; form metal; erect metal structures; set machine tools or make, fit, maintain and repair machinery, equipment or tools; carry out printing work; and produce or process foodstuffs, textiles and wooden, metal and other articles, including handicraft goods.

Tasks include:

- Constructing, maintaining and repairing buildings and other structures;
- Casting, welding and shaping metal;
- Installing and erecting heavy metal structures, tackle and related equipment;
- Making machinery, tools, equipment and other metal articles;
- Setting for operators or setting and operating various machine tools;
- Fitting, maintaining and repairing industrial machinery, engines, vehicles, electrical and electronic instruments and other equipment;
- Making precision instruments, jewellery, household and other precious metal articles, pottery, glass and related products;
- Producing handicrafts; executing printing work;

- Producing and processing foodstuffs and various articles made of wood, textiles, leather and related materials.

8. Plant and Machine Operators and Assemblers

Plant and machine operators and assemblers operate and monitor industrial and agricultural machinery and equipment on the spot or by remote control; drive and operate motor vehicles and mobile machinery and equipment; or assemble products from parts according to strict specifications and procedures.

Tasks include:

- Operating and monitoring mining or other industrial machinery and equipment for processing metal, minerals, glass, ceramics, woods, paper or chemicals;
- Operating and monitoring machinery and equipment used to produce articles made of metal, minerals, chemicals, rubber, plastics, wood, paper, textiles, fur or leather, and which process foodstuffs and related products;
- Driving and operating motor vehicles;
- Driving, operating, and monitoring mobile industrial and agricultural machinery and equipment;
- Assembling products from parts according to strict specifications and procedures.

9. Elementary Occupations

Elementary occupations involve the performance of simple and routine tasks

that may require the use of handheld tools and considerable physical effort.

Tasks include:

- Cleaning, restocking supplies, and performing basic maintenance in apartments, houses, kitchens, hotels, offices, and other buildings;
- Washing cars and windows;
- helping in kitchens and performing simple tasks in food preparation;
- Delivering messages or goods;
- Carrying luggage and handling baggage and freight;
- Collecting and sorting refuse;
- Sweeping streets and similar places;
- performing various simple farming and fishing tasks;
- Performing simple tasks connected with mining, construction, and manufacturing, including product sorting;
- Packing and unpacking produce by hand and filling shelves;
- Providing various street services.

10. Armed Forces Occupations

Armed forces occupations include all jobs held by members of the armed forces, excluding police services. Members of the armed forces are personnel who are currently serving in the armed forces, including auxiliary services, whether on a voluntary or compulsory basis and who are not free to accept civilian employment and are subject to military discipline. Included are regular members of the army and other military services, as well as conscripts enrolled for military training or other service for a specified period.

Description of Sub-major Groups.

11 Chief Executives, Senior Officials and Legislators

These professionals are responsible for formulating policies and strategies, providing overall direction, and representing their organisations or governments at the highest level. They make critical decisions that affect the entire organisation or government entity.

12 Administrative and Commercial Managers

This group includes managers who plan, direct, and coordinate the administrative and commercial activities of organisations. They oversee functions such as finance, human resources, marketing, and sales to ensure efficient operations and profitability.

13 Production and Specialised Services Managers

Managers in this category are responsible for planning, directing, and coordinating production activities and specialised services. This includes manufacturing, construction, logistics, and other technical services to ensure products and services meet quality standards and deadlines.

14 Hospitality, Retail, and Other Services Managers

These managers oversee the operations of establishments that provide accommodation, food services, retail, and other personal services. They ensure customer satisfaction, manage staff and handle financial and administrative tasks.

21 Science and Engineering Professionals

Professionals in this group conduct research, improve or develop concepts,

theories, and operational methods, and apply scientific knowledge in fields such as physics, chemistry, biology, engineering, and technology.

22 Health Professionals

Health professionals diagnose, treat, and prevent illnesses, injuries, and other physical and mental impairments. This group includes doctors, dentists, pharmacists, and other specialised health practitioners.

23 Teaching Professionals

Teaching professionals educate students at various levels, from primary to tertiary education. They develop curricula, deliver lectures, and assess student performance to foster learning and development.

24 Business and Administration Professionals

This group includes professionals who provide specialist advice and services in areas such as finance, human resources, marketing, and public relations. They support organisational decision-making and strategy implementation.

25 Information and Communications Technology Professionals

ICT professionals design, develop and maintain information systems and software applications. They ensure the effective operation of computer networks, databases, and other digital infrastructure.

26 Legal, Social and Cultural Professionals

Professionals in this group provide legal advice, represent clients in legal matters, conduct social research, and engage in cultural activities. This includes lawyers, social workers, and artists.

31 Science and Engineering Associate Professionals

These associate professionals support scientists and engineers by performing technical tasks, conducting experiments, and maintaining equipment. They apply practical skills and knowledge in scientific and engineering fields.

32 Health Associate Professionals

Health associate professionals assist in diagnosing and treating patients, providing therapeutic care, and supporting health professionals. This group includes nurses, midwives, and medical technicians.

33 Business and Administration Associate Professionals

Associate professionals in this category support business operations by performing administrative, financial, and customer service tasks. They assist in implementing business strategies and managing day-to-day activities.

34 Legal, Social, Cultural, and Related Associate Professionals

These associate professionals support legal, social, and cultural activities. They include paralegals, social work assistants, and cultural event coordinators who assist in delivering services and programs.

35 Information and Communications Technicians

ICT technicians install, maintain, and repair computer systems, networks, and telecommunications equipment. They ensure the smooth operation of digital infrastructure and provide technical support.

41 General and Keyboard Clerks

General and keyboard clerks record,

organise, store, and retrieve information. They perform a wide range of clerical and administrative tasks, including data entry, filing, and managing correspondence.

42 Customer Services Clerks

Customer services clerks handle client interactions related to money-handling operations, travel arrangements, information requests, appointments, and operating telephone switchboards.

43 Numerical and Material Recording Clerks

These clerks obtain, compile, and compute accounting, bookkeeping, statistical, financial, and other numerical data. They also manage records of goods produced, purchased, stocked, and dispatched.

44 Other Clerical Support Workers

This group includes clerical support workers not classified elsewhere, such as library clerks, mail carriers, and filing clerks. They perform various administrative tasks to support office operations.

51 Personal Services Workers


Personal services workers provide services related to travel, housekeeping, catering, hairdressing, beauty treatment, animal care, and companionship. They ensure customer satisfaction through personal care and hospitality.

52 Sales Workers

Sales workers demonstrate and sell goods in retail and wholesale establishments, markets, and stalls. They assist customers, manage transactions, and maintain product displays.

53 Personal Care Workers

Personal care workers assist individuals with daily activities, providing care and



support to those who are elderly, disabled, or ill. This includes tasks such as bathing, dressing, and feeding.

54 Protective Services Workers

Protective services workers ensure the safety and security of people and property. This group includes police officers, firefighters, and security guards who respond to emergencies and enforce laws.

61 Market-oriented Skilled Agricultural Workers

These workers manage and perform tasks related to crop production, livestock breeding, and other agricultural activities aimed at producing goods for sale in markets.

62 Market-oriented Skilled Forestry, Fishery and Hunting Workers

Workers in this group are involved in the sustainable management and harvesting of forest resources, fish, and game for commercial purposes.

63 Subsistence Farmers, Fishers, Hunters and Gatherers

Subsistence workers engage in farming, fishing, hunting, and gathering primarily for their consumption rather than for sale or trade.

72 Metal, Machinery, and Related Trades Workers

These trades workers fabricate, assemble, install, and repair metal structures, machinery, and related equipment. They work in industries such as manufacturing, construction, and maintenance.

73 Handicraft and Printing Workers

Handicraft and printing workers create handmade products and printed materials.

This includes artisans, craft workers, and those involved in printing and bookbinding.

74 Electrical and Electronics Trades Workers

Workers in this group install, maintain, and repair electrical and electronic equipment. They ensure the proper functioning of systems such as wiring, circuits, and electronic devices.

75 Food Processing, Woodworking, Garment and Other Craft and Related Trades Workers

These trades workers process food, work with wood, create garments, and engage in other craft-related activities. They produce goods through skilled manual labour.

81 Stationary Plant and Machine Operators

Operators in this group manage and control stationary machinery and equipment used in manufacturing, processing, and other industrial operations.

82 Assemblers

Assemblers put together parts and components to create finished products. They work in manufacturing settings, ensuring that products meet quality standards.

83 Drivers and Mobile Plant Operators

This group includes drivers of vehicles and operators of mobile machinery. They transport goods and passengers and operate equipment such as forklifts and cranes.

91 Cleaners and Helpers

Cleaners and helpers maintain cleanliness in various settings, including offices, homes, and public spaces. They perform tasks such as sweeping, mopping, and waste disposal.

92 Agricultural, Forestry, and Fishery Labourer

Labourers in this group assist with basic tasks in agriculture, forestry, and fishery. They support skilled workers by performing manual labour such as planting, harvesting, and tending to animals.

93 Labourers in Mining, Construction, Manufacturing and Transport

These labourers perform physically demanding tasks in mining, construction, manufacturing, and transport industries. They assist with excavation, building, production, and logistics.

94 Food Preparation Assistants

Food preparation assistants support cooks and chefs by performing tasks such as chopping vegetables, preparing ingredients, and maintaining kitchen cleanliness.

95 Street and Related Sales and Services Workers

Workers in this group sell goods and services in public spaces, such as streets and markets. They include street vendors, market traders, and those providing services like shoe shining.

96 Refuse Workers and Other Elementary Workers

Refuse workers collect and dispose of waste, ensuring cleanliness and sanitation. Other elementary workers perform basic tasks that require minimal training, such as loading and unloading goods.

Description of Minor Groups.

111 Legislators and Senior Officials

Legislators and senior officials are responsible for formulating and enacting

laws, policies, and regulations. They represent the interests of the public, oversee the implementation of government policies, and ensure that public administration operates efficiently and effectively.

112 Managing Directors and Chief Executives

Managing directors and chief executives provide strategic direction and leadership for organisations. They are responsible for making high-level decisions, setting goals, and ensuring that the organisation meets its objectives. They oversee the overall operations and resources of a company or organisation.

121 Business Services and Administration Managers


Business services and administration managers plan, direct, and coordinate the supportive services of an organisation. This includes managing administrative functions such as recordkeeping, mail distribution, and office support services to ensure efficient operations.

122 Sales, Marketing and Development Managers

Sales, marketing, and development managers are responsible for planning and directing the activities related to the promotion and sale of products and services. They develop marketing strategies, manage sales teams, and oversee market research to drive business growth and development.

131 Production Managers in Agricultural, Forestry and Fisheries

Production managers in agriculture, forestry, and fisheries oversee the



production processes in these sectors. They plan and coordinate activities to ensure the efficient and sustainable production of crops, livestock, timber, and fish while adhering to environmental and safety standards.

132 Manufacturing, Mining, Construction and Distribution Managers

These managers are responsible for planning, directing, and coordinating the operations in manufacturing, mining, construction, and distribution. They ensure that production processes run smoothly, resources are used efficiently, and products meet quality standards.

133 Information and Communications Technology Services Managers

ICT services managers plan, direct, and coordinate the activities related to the provision of information and communication technology services. They oversee the development, implementation, and maintenance of IT systems and ensure that technology supports the organisation's goals.

134 Professional Services Managers

Professional services managers oversee the provision of specialised services such as legal, accounting, engineering, and architectural services. They ensure that these services are delivered effectively and meet the needs of clients and stakeholders.

141 Hotel and Restaurant Managers

Hotel and restaurant managers are responsible for the day-to-day operations of hotels, restaurants, and similar establishments. They ensure high standards of customer service, manage staff, oversee financial performance,

and maintain the quality of facilities and services.

142 Retail and Wholesale Trade Managers

Retail and wholesale trade managers plan and direct the operations of retail and wholesale establishments. They manage sales activities, oversee inventory, ensure customer satisfaction, and implement strategies to increase sales and profitability.

143 Other Services Managers

Other service managers oversee the operations of various service-oriented businesses not classified elsewhere. This includes managing activities in sectors such as personal care, repair services, and other miscellaneous services to ensure efficient and effective service delivery.

211 Physical and Earth Science Professionals



212 Mathematicians, Actuaries and Statisticians

213 Life Science Professionals

Life science professionals study living organisms and their interactions with

214 Engineering Professionals (excluding Electro technology)

215 Electro-technology Engineers

216 Architects, Planners, Surveyors and Designers

This group includes professionals who design buildings, plan urban spaces and conduct land surveys. Architects create building designs, urban planners develop land use plans, surveyors measure land and property, and designers create functional and aesthetic spaces.

221 Medical Doctors

Medical doctors diagnose, treat, and prevent illnesses and injuries. They provide medical care to patients, prescribe medications, and perform surgeries. This group includes general practitioners and specialists in various fields of medicine.

222 Nursing and Midwifery Professionals

Nursing and midwifery professionals

provide care and support to patients and expectant mothers. Nurses administer treatments, monitor patient health, and provide education, while midwives assist with childbirth and prenatal care.

223 Traditional and Complementary Medicine Professionals

These professionals practice traditional and complementary medicine, using methods such as acupuncture, herbal medicine, and homoeopathy. They provide alternative treatments to promote health and well-being.

224 Paramedical Practitioners

235 Other Teaching Professionals

261 Legal Professionals

Legal professionals provide legal advice, represent clients in legal matters, and conduct legal research. This group includes lawyers, judges, and legal advisors who ensure the application and interpretation of laws and regulations.

262 Librarians and Related Information Professionals

Librarians and related information professionals manage information resources and provide access to information. They organise, catalogue, and maintain collections of books, digital media, and other information sources.

263 Social and Religious Professionals

264 Authors, Journalists and Linguists

265 Creative and Performing Artists

311 Physical and Engineering Science Technicians

312 Mining, Manufacturing and Construction Supervisors

313 Process Control Technicians

Process control technicians monitor and control industrial processes to ensure they operate efficiently and safely. They use instruments and control systems to regulate variables such as temperature, pressure, and flow in manufacturing and processing plants.

314 Life Science Technicians and Related Associate Professionals





411 General Office Clerks

General office clerks perform a variety of clerical and administrative tasks according

to established procedures. Their duties include filing, typing, record-keeping, and handling correspondence to support the efficient operation of an office.

412 Secretaries (general)

Secretaries (general) use typewriters, personal computers, or other word-processing equipment to transcribe correspondence and other documents. They also manage incoming and outgoing mail, schedule appointments, and perform various administrative support tasks.

413 Keyboard Operators

Keyboard operators input and process text and data and prepare, edit, and generate documents for storage, processing, publication, and transmission. They may also transcribe information recorded in shorthand and on sound recording equipment.

421 Tellers, Money Collectors and Related Clerks



515 Building and Housekeeping Supervisors

Building and housekeeping supervisors oversee the cleaning and maintenance of buildings and facilities. They manage cleaning staff, ensure that cleaning standards are met, and coordinate maintenance activities to keep premises in good condition.

516 Other Personal Services Workers



631 Subsistence Crop Farmers

Subsistence crop farmers grow crops primarily for their consumption rather than for sale. They focus on producing enough food to meet the needs of their household using traditional farming methods.

632 Subsistence Livestock Farmers

Subsistence livestock farmers raise animals mainly for their use. They breed and tend to livestock such as cattle, goats, and poultry to provide meat, milk, and other animal products for their family.

633 Subsistence Mixed Crop and Livestock Farmers

Subsistence mixed crop and livestock farmers engage in both crop cultivation and animal husbandry to meet their household's needs. They grow crops and raise animals, ensuring a diverse supply of food and resources.

634 Subsistence Fishers, Hunters, Trappers and Gatherers

Subsistence fishers, hunters, trappers, and gatherers obtain food and other resources from the wild. They fish, hunt, trap, and gather plants and other natural products primarily for their consumption.

712 Building Finishers and Related Trades Workers

Building finishers and related trades workers complete the final stages of construction projects. They install and finish elements such as flooring, drywall, and insulation, ensuring that buildings are ready for occupancy and meet quality standards.

713 Painters, Building Structure Cleaners and Related Trades Workers

Painters, building structure cleaners, and related trades workers apply paint,

varnish, and other finishes to buildings and structures. They also clean and maintain building exteriors and interiors, ensuring they are aesthetically pleasing and well-maintained.

721 Sheet and Structural Metal Workers, Moulders and Welders and Related Workers

These workers fabricate, assemble, and repair metal structures and components. They work with sheet metal, structural steel, and other materials, using techniques such as welding, moulding, and cutting to create and maintain metal products.

722 Blacksmiths, Toolmakers and Related Trades Workers

Blacksmiths, toolmakers, and related trades workers forge, shape, and repair metal tools and equipment. They use traditional and modern techniques to create tools, machinery parts, and other metal items, ensuring they meet specific requirements.

723 Machinery Mechanics and Repairers



752 Wood Treaters, Cabinet-makers and Related Trades Workers

753 Garment and Related Trades Workers

Garment and related trades workers design, cut, sew, and finish clothing and

textile products. They work in the fashion and textile industries, creating garments, accessories, and other fabric-based items.

754 Other Craft and Related Workers

This group includes craft and related workers not classified elsewhere. They engage in various skilled trades, producing handmade and custom items using a range of materials and techniques.

811 Mining and Mineral Processing Plant Operators

Mining and mineral processing plant operators operate and monitor machinery that extracts minerals and rocks from the earth. They process these materials to produce raw materials for various industries, ensuring efficient and safe operations.

812 Metal Processing and Finishing Plant Operators


Metal processing and finishing plant operators control machinery that processes and finishes metal products. They monitor equipment, adjust settings, and ensure that metal products meet quality standards.

832 Car, Van and Motorcycle Drivers

Car, van, and motorcycle drivers transport passengers and goods using various vehicles. They follow routes, adhere to traffic laws, and ensure the safe delivery of their cargo.

833 Heavy Truck and Bus Drivers

Heavy truck and bus drivers operate large vehicles to transport goods and passengers over long distances. They ensure the safe operation of their vehicles, comply with regulations and maintain schedules.

834 Mobile Plant Operators



931 Mining and Construction Labourers

Mining and construction labourers assist in mining and construction projects by performing physical tasks such as digging, loading, and transporting materials. They support skilled workers and help maintain work sites.

932 Manufacturing Labourers

Manufacturing labourers assist in the production process by performing tasks such as assembling products, operating machinery, and packing goods. They ensure that manufacturing operations run smoothly and efficiently.

933 Transport and Storage Labourers

Transport and storage labourers handle the movement and storage of goods. They load and unload vehicles, move materials within warehouses, and ensure that items are stored correctly and safely.

941 Food Preparation Assistants

Food preparation assistants support cooks and chefs by performing tasks such as chopping vegetables, preparing ingredients, and maintaining kitchen cleanliness. They help ensure that food is prepared efficiently and hygienically.

951 Street and Related Services Workers

Street and related services workers perform various tasks to maintain public spaces. This includes street cleaning, waste collection, and other services that keep streets and public areas clean and orderly.

952 Street Vendors (excluding Food)

Street vendors (excluding food) sell goods such as clothing, accessories, and household items in public spaces. They set up stalls or move through streets to engage with customers and complete sales.

961 Refuse Workers

Refuse workers collect and dispose of waste from homes, businesses, and public spaces. They operate garbage trucks, handle recycling, and ensure that waste is managed in an environmentally responsible manner.

962 Other Elementary Workers

This group includes elementary workers not classified elsewhere, performing a variety of simple and routine tasks. Their duties can range from assisting in construction to providing basic services in various industries.

Description of Unit level.

1111 Legislators

Legislators determine, formulate, and direct policies of national and local governments and international governmental agencies and make, ratify, amend, or repeal laws, public rules, and regulations. They include elected and non-elected members of parliaments, councils and governments.

1112 Senior Government Officials

Senior government officials advise governments on policy matters, oversee the interpretation and implementation of government policies and legislation by government departments and agencies, represent the country abroad and act on its behalf, or carry out similar tasks in intergovernmental organisations. They plan, organise, direct, control, and evaluate the overall activities of municipal or local, regional, and national government departments, boards, agencies, or commissions by legislation and policies established by government and legislative bodies.

1113 Traditional Chiefs and Heads of Villages

Traditional chiefs and heads of villages/gewogs perform a variety of administrative and ceremonial tasks and duties determined by the government rules and regulations.

1114 Senior Officials of Special-interest Organisations

Senior officials of special-interest organisations determine, formulate and direct the implementation of policies of special-interest organisations, such

as political-party organisations, trade and industry associations, humanitarian or charity organisations, or sports associations, and represent their organisations and act on their behalf.

1120 Managing Directors and Chief Executives

Managing directors and chief executives formulate and review the policies and plan, direct, coordinate, and evaluate the overall activities of enterprises (except special-interest organisations and government departments) with the support of other managers, usually within guidelines established by a board of directors or a governing body to whom they are answerable for the operations undertaken and results.

1211 Finance Managers


Finance managers plan, direct, and coordinate the financial operations of an enterprise or organisation in consultation with senior managers and with managers of other departments or sections or of enterprises that provide financial services to other enterprises and organisations.

1212 Human Resource Managers

Human resource managers plan, direct, and coordinate policies concerning the personnel, industrial relations, and occupational health and safety activities of an enterprise or organisation or of enterprises that provide human resource services to other enterprises and organisations.

1213 Policy and Planning Managers

Policy and planning managers plan, organise, direct, and coordinate policy advice and strategic planning activities



within government or for non-government organisations and private sector agencies or manage the activities of enterprises that provide policy and strategic planning services.

1219 Business Services and Administration Managers Not Elsewhere Classified

Business Services and Administration Managers. For instance, the group includes occupations such as facilities manager, cleaning services manager, and administrative services manager employed either as the manager of a department of a large enterprise or organisation or of an enterprise that provides such services to other enterprises and organisations.

1221 Sales and Marketing Managers

Sales and marketing managers plan, direct, and coordinate the sales and marketing activities of an enterprise or organisation or of enterprises that provide sales and marketing services to other enterprises and organisations.

1222 Advertising and Public Relations Managers

Advertising and public relations managers plan, direct, and coordinate the advertising, public relations, and public information activities of enterprises and organisations or of enterprises that provide related services to other enterprises and organisations.

1223 Research and Development Managers

Research and development managers plan, direct, and coordinate the research and development activities of an enterprise or organisation or of enterprises that provide related services to other enterprises and organisations.

1311 Agricultural and Forestry Production Managers

Agricultural and forestry production managers plan, direct, and coordinate production in large-scale agricultural, horticultural, and forestry operations such as plantations, large ranches, collective farms, and agricultural cooperatives to grow and harvest crops and breed and raise livestock.

1312 Aquaculture and Fisheries Production Managers

Aquaculture and fisheries production managers plan, direct, and coordinate production in large-scale aquaculture and fishery operations to harvest fish and to grow fish as cash crops or for release into freshwater.

1321 Manufacturing Managers


Manufacturing managers plan, direct, and coordinate activities concerned with the production of goods, the production and distribution of electricity and water, and the collection, treatment, and disposal of waste. They may manage the production departments of large enterprises or be the managers of small manufacturing companies.

1322 Mining Managers

Mining managers plan, direct, and coordinate the production activities of mining and quarrying extraction operations, either as the manager of a department or as the general manager of an enterprise or organisation that does not have a hierarchy of managers.

1323 Construction Managers

Construction managers plan, direct, and coordinate the construction of civil



engineering projects, buildings, and dwellings, either as the manager of a department or as the general manager of an enterprise or organisation that does not have a hierarchy of managers.

1324 Supply, Distribution, and Related Managers

Supply, distribution, and related managers plan, direct, and coordinate passenger transportation systems and facilities and the supply, transportation, storage, and distribution of goods, either as the manager of a department or as the general manager of an enterprise or organisation that does not have a hierarchy of managers.

1330 Information and Communications Technology Services Managers

Information and communications technology services managers plan, direct, and coordinate the acquisition, development, maintenance, and use of computer and telecommunication systems, either as the manager of a department or as the general manager of an enterprise or organisation that does not have a hierarchy of managers.

1341 Child Care Services Managers

Child care services managers plan, direct, coordinate, and evaluate the provision of care for children in before-school, after-school, vacation, and daycare centres and services.

1342 Health Services Managers

Health services managers plan, direct, coordinate, and evaluate the provision of clinical and community healthcare services in hospitals, clinics, public health agencies, and similar organisations.

1343 Aged Care Services Managers

Aged care services managers plan, direct, coordinate, and evaluate the provision of residential and personal care services for individuals and families who need such services due to the effects of ageing.

1344 Social Welfare Managers

Social welfare managers plan, direct and coordinate the provision of social and community service programmes such as income support, family assistance, children's services and other community programmes and services.

1345 Education Managers


Education managers plan, direct, coordinate and evaluate the educational and administrative aspects of education services, primary and secondary schools, colleges and faculties and departments in universities and other educational institutions.

1346 Financial and Insurance Services Branch Managers

Financial and insurance services branch managers plan, direct and coordinate the branches of institutions that provide financial and insurance services, such as banks and insurance companies. They provide advice and assistance to clients on financial and insurance matters.

1349 Professional Services Managers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers managers who plan, direct, coordinate and evaluate the provision of specialised professional and technical services and are not classified in 'Business Services and Administration Managers' or elsewhere in 'Professional Services Managers'. For instance,



managers responsible for the provision of policing, correctional, library, legal and fire services are classified here.

1411 Hotel Managers

Hotel managers plan, organise and direct the operations of hotels, motels and similar establishments to provide guest accommodation and other services.

1412 Restaurant Managers

Restaurant managers plan, organise, and direct the operations of cafés, restaurants and related establishments to provide dining and catering services.

1420 Retail and Wholesale Trade Managers

Retail and wholesale trade managers plan, organise, coordinate and control the operations of establishments that sell goods on a retail or wholesale basis. They are responsible for the budgets, staffing and strategic and operational direction of shops or of all units within shops that sell particular types of products.

1431 Sports, Recreation and Cultural Centre Managers

Sports, recreation, and cultural centre managers plan, organise and control the operations of establishments that provide sporting, artistic, theatrical and other recreational and amenity services.

1439 Services Managers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers managers that plan, direct, and coordinate the provision of services and are not classified as 'Production and Specialised Services Managers' or elsewhere in 'Hospitality, Retail and Other Services Managers'. For instance, managers of travel agencies, conference centres, contact centres and

shopping centres are classified here.

2111 Physicists and Astronomers

Physicists and astronomers conduct research and improve or develop concepts, theories and operational methods concerning matter, space, time, energy, forces and fields and the interrelationship between these physical phenomena. They apply scientific knowledge relating to physics and astronomy in industrial, medical, or other fields.

2112 Meteorologists

Meteorologists prepare short-term or long-term weather forecasts used in aviation, shipping, agriculture and other areas and for the information of the general public. They conduct research related to the composition, structure and dynamics of the atmosphere.

2113 Chemists

Chemists conduct research, improve or develop concepts, theories and operational methods, or apply scientific knowledge relating to chemistry to develop new knowledge or products and for quality and process control.

2114 Geologists and Geophysicists

Geologists and geophysicists conduct research; improve or develop concepts, theories and operational methods; or apply scientific knowledge relating to geology and geophysics in such fields as mineral exploration and extraction, water conservation, civil engineering, telecommunications and navigation, and assessment and mitigation of the effects of development and waste disposal projects on the environment.

2120 Mathematicians, Actuaries and Statisticians

Mathematicians, actuaries and statisticians conduct research and improve or develop mathematical, actuarial and statistical concepts, theories and operational methods and techniques and advise on or engage in their practical application in such fields as engineering, business, social and other sciences.

2131 Biologists, Botanists, Zoologists and Related Professionals

Biologists, botanists, zoologists and related professionals study living organisms and their interactions with each other and with the environment and apply this knowledge to solving human health and environmental problems. They work in diverse fields such as botany, zoology, ecology, marine biology, genetics, immunology, pharmacology, toxicology, physiology, bacteriology and virology.

2132 Farming, Forestry and Fisheries Advisers

Farming, forestry and fisheries advisers' study and provide assistance and advice on farm, forestry and fisheries management, including cultivation, fertilisation, harvesting, soil erosion and composition, disease prevention, nutrition, crop rotation and marketing. They develop techniques for increasing productivity and study and develop plans and policies for land and fisheries management.

2133 Environmental Protection Professionals

Environmental protection professionals' study and assess the effects on the environment of human activity, such

as air, water and noise pollution, soil contamination, climate change, toxic waste and depletion and degradation of natural resources. They develop plans and solutions to protect, conserve, restore, minimise and prevent further damage to the environment.

2141 Industrial and Production Engineers

Industrial and production engineers conduct research and design, organise and oversee the construction, operation and maintenance of industrial production processes and installations. They establish programmes for the coordination of manufacturing activities and assess cost-effectiveness and safety.

2142 Civil Engineers


Civil engineers conduct research, advise on, design, and direct construction; manage the operation and maintenance of civil engineering structures; or study and advise on technological aspects of particular materials.

2143 Environmental Engineers

Environmental engineers conduct research, advise on, design and direct implementation of solutions to prevent, control or remedy negative impacts of human activity on the environment, utilising a variety of engineering disciplines. They conduct environmental assessments of construction and civil engineering projects and apply engineering principles to pollution control, recycling and waste disposal.

2144 Mechanical Engineers

Mechanical engineers conduct research on industrial plants, equipment and systems; advise on and direct their functioning,



maintenance and repair; or study and advise on mechanical aspects of particular materials, products or processes.

2145 Chemical Engineers

Chemical engineers conduct research and develop, advise on and direct commercial-scale chemical processes and production of various substances and items such as food and drink products, medicines, or synthetic materials. They direct the maintenance and repair of chemical plants and equipment and study and advise on chemical aspects of particular materials, products or processes.

2146 Mining Engineers, Metallurgists and Related Professionals

Mining engineers, metallurgists and related professionals conduct research on, design, develop and maintain commercial-scale methods of extracting metals from their ores, or minerals, water from the earth, and of developing new alloys, ceramic and other materials or study and advise on mining or metallurgical aspects of particular materials, products or processes.

2147 Transport and Vehicle Engineers

These engineers design, develop, and oversee the manufacturing and maintenance of transport vehicles and systems, including automobiles, aircraft, ships, and trains. They ensure safety, efficiency, and compliance with regulations.

2149 Engineering Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers engineering professionals not classified elsewhere in Minor Group 214: Engineering Professionals

(excluding Electro Technology) or in Minor Group 215: Electro Technology Engineers.

2151 Electrical Engineers

Electrical engineers conduct research and advise on, design and direct the construction and operation of electrical systems, components, motors and equipment, and advise on and direct their functioning, maintenance and repair, or study and advise on technological aspects of electrical engineering materials, products and processes.

2152 Electronics Engineers

Electronics engineers research, design, and direct the construction functioning, maintenance and repair of electronic systems, and study and advise on technological aspects of electronic engineering materials, products or processes.

2153 Telecommunications Engineers


Telecommunications engineers conduct research and advise on, design and direct the construction, functioning, maintenance and repair of telecommunication systems and equipment. They study and advise on technological aspects of telecommunication engineering materials, products or processes.

2161 Building Architects

Building architects design commercial, industrial, institutional, residential and recreational buildings and plan and monitor their construction, maintenance and rehabilitation.

2162 Landscape Architects

Landscape architects plan and design landscapes and open spaces for projects such as parks, schools, institutions,



roads, and external areas for commercial, industrial and residential sites and plan and monitor their construction, maintenance and rehabilitation.

2163 Product and Garment Designers

Product and garment designers design and develop products for manufacture and prepare designs and specifications of products for mass, batch and one-off production.

2164 Town and Traffic Planners

Town and traffic planners develop and implement plans and policies for the controlled use of urban and rural land and traffic systems. They conduct research and provide advice on economic, environmental and social factors affecting land use and traffic flows.

2165 Cartographers and Surveyors

Cartographers and surveyors determine the exact position of or prepare and revise digital, graphic and pictorial maps, charts or other visual representations of natural and constructed features and boundaries of land, seas, underground areas and celestial bodies, applying scientific and mathematical principles.

2166 Graphic and Multimedia Designers

Graphic and multimedia designers design visual and audio-visual content for the communication of information using print, film, electronic, digital and other forms of visual and audio media. They create graphics, special effects, animation or other visual images for use in computer games, movies, music videos, print media and advertisements.

2211 Generalist Medical Practitioners

Generalist medical practitioners diagnose, treat and prevent illness, disease, injury

and other physical and mental impairments and maintain general health in humans through the application of the principles and procedures of modern medicine. They do not limit their practice to certain disease categories or methods of treatment and may assume responsibility for the provision of continuing and comprehensive medical care to individuals, families and communities.

2212 Specialist Medical Practitioners


Specialist medical practitioners (medical doctors) diagnose, treat and prevent illness, disease, injury and other physical and mental impairments in humans, using specialised testing, diagnostic, medical, surgical, physical and psychiatric techniques through the application of the principles and procedures of modern medicine. They specialise in certain disease categories, types of patient or methods of treatment and may conduct medical education and research in their chosen areas of specialisation.

2221 Nursing Professionals

Nursing professionals provide treatment, support and care services for people who need nursing care due to the effects of ageing, injury, illness, other physical or mental impairment, or potential health risks. They assume responsibility for the planning and management of the care of patients, including the supervision of other healthcare workers, working autonomously or in teams with medical doctors and others in the practical application of preventive and curative measures.

2222 Midwifery Professionals

Midwifery professionals plan, manage, provide and evaluate midwifery care



services before, during and after pregnancy and childbirth. They provide delivery care for reducing health risks to women and newborn children, working autonomously or in teams with other health care providers.

2230 Traditional and Complementary Medicine Professionals

Traditional and complementary medicine professionals examine patients, prevent and treat illness, disease, injury and other physical and mental impairments and maintain general health in humans by applying knowledge, skills and practices acquired through extensive study of the theories, beliefs and experiences originating in specific cultures.

2240 Paramedical Practitioners

Paramedical practitioners provide advisory, diagnostic, curative and preventive medical services more limited in scope and complexity than those carried out by medical doctors. They work autonomously or with limited supervision of medical doctors and apply advanced clinical procedures for treating and preventing diseases, injuries and other physical or mental impairments common to specific communities.

2250 Veterinarians

Veterinarians diagnose, prevent and treat diseases, injuries and dysfunctions of animals. They may provide care to a wide range of animals, specialise in the treatment of a particular animal group or a particular speciality area, or provide professional services to commercial firms producing biological and pharmaceutical products.

2261 Dentists

Dentists diagnose, treat and prevent diseases, injuries and abnormalities of the teeth, mouth, jaws and associated tissues by applying the principles and procedures of modern dentistry. They use a broad range of specialised diagnostic, surgical and other techniques to promote and restore oral health.

2262 Pharmacists


Pharmacists store, preserve, compound and dispense medicinal products and counsel on the proper use and adverse effects of drugs and medicines following prescriptions issued by medical doctors and other health professionals. They contribute to researching, testing, preparing, prescribing and monitoring medicinal therapies for optimising human health.

2263 Environmental and Occupational Health and Hygiene Professionals

Environmental and occupational health and hygiene professionals assess, plan and implement programmes to recognise, monitor and control environmental factors that can potentially affect human health, ensure safe and healthy working conditions and prevent disease or injury caused by chemical, physical, radiological and biological agents or ergonomic factors.

2264 Physiotherapists

Physiotherapists assess, plan and implement rehabilitative programmes that improve or restore human motor functions, maximise movement ability, relieve pain syndromes, and treat or prevent physical challenges associated with injuries, diseases and other impairments. They



apply a broad range of physical therapies and techniques such as movement, ultrasound, heating, laser and other techniques.

2265 Dieticians and Nutritionists

Dieticians and nutritionists assess, plan and implement programmes to enhance the impact of food and nutrition on human health.

2266 Audiologists and Speech Therapists

Audiologists and speech therapists evaluate, manage and treat physical disorders affecting human hearing, speech, communication and swallowing. They prescribe corrective devices or rehabilitative therapies for hearing loss, speech disorders and related sensory and neural problems and provide counselling on hearing safety and communication performance.

2267 Optometrists and Ophthalmic Opticians

Optometrists and ophthalmic opticians provide diagnosis, management and treatment services for disorders of the eyes and visual system. They counsel on eye care and prescribe optical aids or other therapies for visual disturbance.

2268 Occupational Therapists

Occupational therapists help individuals improve their ability to perform tasks in their daily living and working environments. They work with people who have physical, mental, or developmental conditions to enhance their independence and quality of life.

2269 Health Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers health professionals not classified elsewhere in Sub-major

Group 22: Health Professionals. For instance, the group includes occupations such as podiatrist, occupational therapist, recreational therapist, chiropractor, osteopath and other professionals providing diagnostic, preventive, curative and rehabilitative health services.

2310 University and Higher Education Teachers

University and higher education teachers prepare and deliver lectures and conduct tutorials in one or more subjects within a prescribed course of study at a university or other higher educational institution. They conduct research and prepare scholarly papers and books.

2320 Vocational Education Teachers

Vocational education teachers teach or instruct vocational or occupational subjects in adult and further education institutions and to senior students in secondary schools and colleges. They prepare students for employment in specific occupations or occupational areas for which university or higher education is not normally required.

2330 Secondary Education Teachers


Secondary education teachers teach one or more subjects at the secondary education level, excluding subjects intended to prepare students for employment in specific occupational areas.

2341 Primary School Teachers

Primary school teachers teach a range of subjects at the primary education level.

2342 Early Childhood Educators

Early childhood educators promote the social, physical, and intellectual development of children below primary



school age through the provision of educational and play activities.

2351 Education Methods Specialists

Education methods specialists conduct research and develop or advise on teaching methods, courses and aids. They review and examine teachers' work, the functioning of educational institutions, and the results achieved and recommend changes and improvements.

2352 Special Needs Teachers

Special needs teachers teach physically or mentally handicapped children, young persons or adults, or those with learning difficulties or other special needs. They promote the social, emotional, intellectual and physical development of their students.

2353 Other Language Teachers

Other language teachers teach non-native languages to adults and children who are learning a language for reasons of migration, to fulfil employment requirements or opportunities, to facilitate participation in educational programmes delivered in a foreign language, or for personal enrichment. They work outside the mainstream primary, secondary and higher education systems or in support of students and teachers within those systems.

2354 Other Music Teachers

Other music teachers teach students in the practice, theory and performance of music outside the mainstream primary, secondary and higher education systems but may provide private or small group tuition as an extracurricular activity in association with mainstream educational institutions.

2355 Other Arts Teachers

Other arts teachers teach students in the practice, theory and performance of dance, drama, visual and other arts (excluding music) outside the mainstream primary, secondary and higher education systems but may provide private or small group tuition as an extracurricular activity in association with mainstream educational institutions.

2356 Information Technology Trainers

Information technology trainers develop, schedule and conduct training programmes and courses for computer and other information technology users outside the mainstream primary, secondary and higher education systems.

2359 Teaching Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers teaching professionals not classified elsewhere in Sub-major Group 23: Teaching Professionals. For instance, the group includes those who provide private tuition in subjects other than foreign languages and the arts and those who provide educational counselling to students.

2411 Accountants

Accountants plan, organise and administer accounting systems for individuals and establishments. Some occupations classified here examine and analyse the accounting and financial records of individuals and establishments to ensure accuracy and compliance with established accounting standards and procedures.

2412 Financial and Investment Advisers

Financial and investment advisers develop financial plans for individuals to invest and manage funds on their behalf.

2413 Financial Analysts

Financial analysts conduct quantitative analyses of information affecting investment programmes of public or private institutions.

2421 Management and Organisation Analysts

Management and organisation analysts assist in achieving greater efficiency and solving all problems. They study all structures, methods, systems and procedures.

2422 Policy Administration Professionals

Policy administration professionals develop and analyse policies guiding the design, implementation and modification of government and commercial operations and programmes.

2423 Personnel and Careers Professionals

Personnel and careers professionals provide professional business services related to personnel policies, such as employee recruitment or development, occupational analysis and vocational guidance.

2424 Training and Staff Development Professionals

Training and staff development professionals plan, develop, implement and evaluate training and development programmes to ensure management and staff acquire the skills and develop the competencies required by s to meet all objectives.

2429 Administration Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This group includes professionals engaged in administrative tasks that do not fall under other specific categories. Their roles

may involve policy formulation, strategic planning, and organisational development across various sectors.

2431 Advertising and Marketing Professionals

Advertising and marketing professionals develop and coordinate advertising strategies and campaigns, determine the market for new goods and services, and identify and develop market opportunities for new and existing goods and services.

2432 Public Relations Professionals

Public relations professionals plan, develop, implement and evaluate information and communication strategies that create an understanding and a favourable view of businesses and others, their goods and services, and their role in the community.

2433 Technical and Medical Sales Professionals (excluding ICT)


Technical and medical sales professionals (excluding ICT) represent companies in selling a range of industrial, medical and pharmaceutical goods and services to industrial, business, professional and other establishments.

2434 Information and Communications Technology Sales Professionals

Information and communications technology (ICT) sales professionals sell, at the wholesale level, a range of computer hardware, software and other information and communications technology goods and services, including installations, and provide specialised information as required.

2511 Systems Analysts

Systems analysts conduct research, analyse and evaluate client information



technology requirements, procedures or problems, and develop and implement proposals, recommendations, and plans to improve current or future information systems.

2512 Software Developers

Software developers research, analyse and evaluate requirements for existing or new software applications and operating systems and design, develop, test and maintain software solutions to meet these requirements.

2513 Web and Multimedia Developers

Web and multimedia development professionals combine design and technical knowledge to research, analyse, evaluate, design, program and modify websites and applications that draw together text, graphics, animations, imaging, audio and video displays and other interactive media.

2514 Applications Programmers

Applications programmers write and maintain programmable code outlined in technical instructions and specifications for software applications and operating systems.

2519 Software and Applications Developers and Analysts Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers software and applications developers and analysts not classified elsewhere in Minor Group 251: Software and Applications Developers and Analysts. For instance, the group includes those professionals specialising in quality assurance, including software testing.

2521 Database Designers and Administrators

Database designers and administrators design, develop, control, maintain and

support the optimal performance and security of databases.

2522 Systems Administrators

Systems administrators develop, control, maintain and support the optimal performance and security of information technology systems.

2523 Computer Network Professionals

Computer network professionals research, analyse, design, test and recommend strategies for network architecture and development. They implement, manage, maintain and configure network hardware and software and monitor, troubleshoot and optimise performance.

2529 Database and Network Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group includes database and network professionals not classified elsewhere in 'Database and Network Professionals'. For instance, the group includes information and communications technology security specialists.

2611 Lawyers


Lawyers give clients legal advice on a wide variety of subjects, draw up legal documents, represent clients before administrative boards or tribunals and plead cases, conduct prosecutions in courts of justice, or instruct barristers to plead in higher courts of justice.

2612 Judges

Judges preside over civil and criminal proceedings in courts of law.

2613 Legal Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

Legal professionals in this category provide specialised legal services that are not covered by other specific legal



occupations. They may include legal advisors, consultants, and other experts offering legal guidance and support.

2619 Legal Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers legal professionals not classified elsewhere in 'Legal Professionals'. For instance, the group includes those who perform legal functions other than pleading or prosecuting cases or presiding over judicial proceedings.

2621 Archivists and Curators

Archivists and curators collect, appraise and ensure the safekeeping and preservation of the contents of archives, artefacts and records of historical, cultural, administrative and artistic interest, and art and other objects. They plan, devise and implement systems for the safekeeping of records and historically valuable documents.

2622 Librarians and Related Information Professionals

Librarians and related information professionals collect, select, develop, organise and maintain library collections and other information repositories; organise and control other library services and provide information for users.

2631 Economists

Economists conduct research, monitor data, analyse information, prepare reports and plans to resolve economic and business problems and develop models to analyse, explain and forecast economic behaviour and patterns. They provide advice to businesses, interest groups and governments to formulate solutions to present or projected economic and business problems.

2632 Sociologists, Anthropologists and Related Professionals

Sociologists, anthropologists, and related professionals investigate and describe the structure, origin and evolution of societies and the interdependence between environmental conditions and human activities. They provide advice on the practical application of their findings in the formulation of economic and social policies.

2633 Philosophers, Historians and Political Scientists

Philosophers, historians and political scientists conduct research into the nature of human experience and existence, phases or aspects of human history, and political structures, movements and behaviour. They document and report on findings to inform and guide political and individual actions.

2634 Psychologists

Psychologists research and study the mental processes and behaviour of human beings as individuals or in groups and apply this knowledge to promote personal, social, educational or occupational adjustment and development.

2635 Social Work and Counselling Professionals

Social work and counselling professionals provide advice and guidance to individuals, families, groups, and communities in response to social and personal difficulties. They assist clients to develop skills and access resources and support services needed to respond to issues arising from unemployment, poverty, disability, addiction, criminal and delinquent behaviour, and marital and other problems.

2636 Religious Professionals

Religious professionals function as perpetrators of sacred traditions, practices and beliefs. They conduct religious services, celebrate or administer the rites of a religious faith or denomination, provide spiritual and moral guidance and perform other functions associated with the practice of a religion.

2641 Authors and Related Writers

Authors and related writers plan, research and write books, scripts, storyboards, plays, essays, speeches, manuals, specifications and other non-journalistic articles (excluding material for newspapers, magazines and other periodicals) for publication or presentation.

2642 Journalists

Journalists research, investigate, interpret and communicate news and public affairs through newspapers, television, radio and other media.

2643 Translators, Interpreters and Other Linguists

Translators and interpreters translate or interpret from one language into another and study the origin, development and structure of languages.

2651 Visual Artists

Visual artists create and execute works of art by sculpting, painting, drawing, creating cartoons, engraving or using other techniques.

2652 Musicians, Composers and Singers

Musicians, composers, and singers write, arrange, conduct and perform musical compositions.

2653 Dancers and Choreographers

Dancers and choreographers conceive and create or perform dances.

2654 Film, Stage and Related Directors and Producers

Film, stage and related directors and producers oversee and control the technical and artistic aspects of motion pictures, television or radio productions, commercials, videos and stage shows.

2655 Actors

Actors portray roles in motion pictures, television or radio productions and stage shows.

2656 Announcers on Radio, Television and Other Media

Radio and television presenters and related professionals read news bulletins, conduct interviews, and make other announcements or introductions on radio, television, and in theatres and other establishments or media.

2659 Creative and Performing Artists Not Elsewhere Classified


This unit group covers all creative and performing artists not classified elsewhere in 'Creative and Performing Artists'. For instance, the group includes clowns, magicians, acrobats and other performing artists.

3111 Chemical and Physical Science Technicians

Chemical and physical science technicians perform technical tasks to aid in research in chemistry, physics, geology, geophysics, meteorology and astronomy and the development of industrial, medical, military and other practical applications of research results.

3112 Civil Engineering Technicians

Civil engineering technicians perform technical tasks in civil engineering



research, design, construction, operation, maintenance and repair of buildings and other structures, such as water supply and wastewater treatment systems, bridges, roads, dams and airports.

3113 Electrical Engineering Technicians

Electrical engineering technicians perform technical tasks to aid in electrical engineering research and the design, manufacture, assembly, construction, operation, maintenance and repair of electrical equipment, facilities and distribution systems.

3114 Electronics Engineering Technicians

Electronics engineering technicians perform technical tasks to aid in electronic research and the design, manufacture, assembly, construction, operation, maintenance and repair of electronic equipment.

3115 Mechanical Engineering Technicians

Mechanical engineering technicians perform technical tasks to aid in mechanical engineering research and the design, manufacture, assembly, construction, operation, maintenance and repair of machines, components and mechanical equipment.

3116 Chemical Engineering Technicians

Chemical engineering technicians perform technical tasks to aid in chemical engineering research and the design, manufacture, construction, operations, maintenance and repair of chemical plants.

3117 Mining and Metallurgical Technicians

Mining and metallurgical technicians perform technical tasks to assist in research and experiments related to metallurgy, in improving methods of

extracting solid minerals in the design, construction, operation, maintenance and repair of mines and mine installations, of systems for transporting and storing, and for extraction of metals from ores.

3118 Draughtsmen

Draughtsmen prepare technical drawings, maps and illustrations from sketches, measurements and other data and copy final drawings and paintings onto printing plates.

3119 Physical and Engineering Science Technicians Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers physical and engineering science technicians not classified elsewhere in 'Physical and engineering science technicians. For instance, those who assist engineers engaged in developing procedures or conducting research on safety, biomedical, environmental or mining and metallurgical engineering should be classified here.

3121 Mining Supervisors

Mining supervisors oversee mining and quarrying operations and directly supervise and coordinate the activities of miners working in underground and surface mines and quarries.

3121 Manufacturing Supervisors

Manufacturing supervisors coordinate and supervise the activities of process control technicians, machine operators, assemblers and other manufacturing labourers.

3121 Construction Supervisors

Construction supervisors coordinate, supervise and schedule the activities of workers engaged in the construction and repair of buildings and structures.

3131 Power Production Plant Operators

Power production plant operators operate, monitor and maintain switchboards and related equipment in electrical control centres, which control the production and distribution of electrical or other power transmission networks. The equipment operated includes reactors, turbines, generators and other auxiliary equipment in electrical power-generating stations.

3132 Incinerator and Water Treatment Plant Operators

Incinerator and water treatment plant operators monitor and operate computerised control systems and related equipment in solid and liquid waste treatment plants to regulate the treatment and disposal of sewerage and wastes and in water filtration and treatment plants to regulate the treatment and distribution of water.

3133 Chemical Processing Plant Controllers

Chemical processing plant controllers operate and monitor chemical plants and related multifunction process control machinery and adjust and maintain processing units and equipment which distil, filter, separate, heat or refine chemicals.

3134 Petroleum and Natural Gas Refining Plant Operators

These operators manage and control the equipment and processes involved in refining petroleum and natural gas. They ensure the efficient and safe production of fuels and other products, adhering to environmental and safety standards.

3135 Metal Production Process Controllers

Metal production process controllers operate and monitor multi-function process control machinery and equipment to control the processing of metal converting and refining furnaces, metal rolling mills and metal heat treating or metal extrusion plants.

3139 Process Control Technician Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers process control technicians not classified elsewhere in minor group 313: Process Control Technicians. For instance, the unit group includes those who operate multiple process control equipment in manufacturing assembly lines and paper and pulp production.

3141 Life Science Technicians (Except Medical)


Life science technicians (except medical) provide technical support to life science professionals undertaking research, analysis and testing of living organisms and development and application of products and processes resulting from research in areas such as agriculture, natural resource management, environmental protection, plant and animal biology, microbiology and cell and molecular biology.

3142 Agricultural Technicians

Agricultural technicians perform tests and experiments and provide technical and scientific support to horticultural scientists, as well as agricultural scientists, farmers and farm managers.

3142 Forestry Technicians

Forestry technicians perform technical and provisory functions in support of forestry research and forest management,



harvesting, resource conservation and environment protection.

3151 Ships' Engineers

Ships' engineers are responsible for the operation, maintenance, and repair of the mechanical and electrical systems on board ships. They ensure the vessel's propulsion and other systems function efficiently and safely.

3152 Ships' Deck Officers and Pilots

These professionals navigate and operate ships, ensuring safe passage and adherence to maritime regulations. Deck officers manage the crew and oversee the loading and unloading of cargo, while pilots guide ships through hazardous or congested waters.

3153 Aircraft Pilots and Related Associate Professionals

Aircraft pilots and related associate professionals control the operation of mechanical, electrical and electronic equipment to navigate aircraft for transporting passengers, mail and freight and perform related pre-flight and in-flight tasks.

3154 Air Traffic Controllers

Air traffic controllers' direct aircraft movements in airspace and on the ground, using radio, radar and lighting systems and provide information relevant to the operation of aircraft.

3155 Air Traffic Safety Electronic Technicians

Air traffic safety electronics technicians perform technical tasks concerning the management, operation, maintenance and repair of air traffic control and air navigation systems.

3211 Medical Imaging and Therapeutic Equipment Technicians

Medical imaging and therapeutic equipment technicians test and operate radiographic, ultrasound and other medical imaging equipment to produce images of body structures for the diagnosis and treatment of injury, disease and other impairments.

3212 Medical and Pathology Laboratory Technicians

Medical and pathology laboratory technicians perform clinical tests on specimens of bodily fluids and tissues to obtain information about the health of a patient or cause of death.

3213 Pharmaceutical Technicians and Assistants


Pharmacy technicians perform a variety of tasks associated with dispensing medicinal products under the guidance of a pharmacist or other health professional.

3214 Medical and Dental Prosthetic Technicians

Medical and dental prosthetic technicians fit, service and repair medical and dental devices and appliances following prescriptions or instructions established by a health professional. They may service a wide range of support instruments to correct physical medical or dental problems, such as neck braces, orthopaedic splints, artificial limbs, hearing aids, arch supports, dentures and dental crowns and bridges.

3221 Nursing Associate Professionals

Nursing associate professionals provide basic nursing and personal care for people in need of such care due to the effects of



ageing, illness, injury or other physical or mental impairment. They generally work under the supervision of and in support of the implementation of health care, treatment and referral plans established by medical, nursing and other health professionals.

3230 Traditional and Complementary Medicine Associate Professionals

Traditional and complementary medicine associate professionals prevent and treat human physical and mental illnesses, disorders and injuries using herbal and other therapies based on theories, beliefs and experiences originating in specific cultures.

3240 Veterinary Technicians and Assistants

Veterinary technicians and assistants carry out advisory, diagnostic, preventive and curative veterinary tasks, more limited in scope and complexity than those carried out by and with the guidance of veterinarians. They care for animals under treatment and in temporary residence at veterinary facilities, perform routine procedures and assist veterinarians in performing procedures and operations.

3251 Dental Assistants and Therapists

Dental assistants and therapists provide basic dental care services for the prevention and treatment of diseases and disorders of the teeth and mouth, as per care plans and procedures established by a dentist or other oral health professional.

3252 Medical Records and Health Information Technicians

Medical records and health information technicians develop, maintain and

implement health records processing, storage and retrieval systems in medical facilities and other health care settings and meet the legal, professional, ethical and administrative record-keeping requirements of health services delivery.

3253 Community Health Workers

Community health workers provide health education, referral and follow-up, case management, basic preventive health care and home visiting services to specific communities. They provide support and assistance to individuals and families in navigating the health and social services system.

3254 Dispensing Opticians

Opticians design, fit and dispense optical lenses based on a prescription from an ophthalmologist or optometrist for the correction of reduced visual acuity. They service corrective eyeglasses, contact lenses, low-vision aids and other optical devices.

3255 Physiotherapy Technicians and Related Associate Professionals

Physiotherapy technicians and related associate professionals provide physical treatments to patients in circumstances where functional movement is threatened by injury, disease or impairment. Therapies are usually provided according to rehabilitative plans established by a physiotherapist or other health professional.

3256 Medical Assistants

Medical assistant performs basic clinical and administrative tasks to support patient care under the direct supervision of a medical practitioner or other health professional.

3257 Environmental and Occupational Health Inspectors and Associates

Environmental and occupational health inspectors investigate the implementation of rules and regulations relating to environmental factors that can potentially affect human health and occupational health in the workplace.

3258 Ambulance Workers

Ambulance workers provide emergency health care to patients who are injured, sick, infirm or otherwise physically or mentally impaired before and during transport to medical facilities.

3259 Health Associate Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers health associate professionals not classified elsewhere in 'Health associate professionals.

3311 Securities and Finance Dealers and Brokers

Securities and finance dealers and brokers buy and sell securities, stock, bonds and other financial instruments and deal on the foreign exchange, on the spot or futures markets, on behalf of their own company or for customers on a commission basis. They recommend transactions to clients or senior management.

3312 Credit and Loans Officers

Credit and loan officers analyse and evaluate financial information on applications for credit and loans and determine approval or disapproval of the client for the credit or loan or recommend to management approval or disapproval.

3313 Accounting Associate Professionals

Accounting associate professionals maintain complete records of financial

transactions of an undertaking and verify the accuracy of documents and records relating to such transactions.

3314 Statistical, Mathematical and Related Associate Professionals

Statistical, mathematical and related associate professionals assist in planning the collection, processing and presentation of statistical, mathematical or actuarial data and in carrying out these operations, usually working under the guidance of statisticians, mathematicians and actuaries.

3315 Valuers and Loss Assessors

Valuers and loss assessors value property and various goods and assess losses covered by insurance policies.

3321 Insurance Representatives

Insurance representatives and related associate professionals advise on and sell life, accident, automobile, liability, endowment, fire and other types of insurance to new and established clients.

3322 Commercial Sales Executives

Commercial and marketing sales executives represent companies that sell various goods and services to businesses and other organisations and provide specific information as required.

3323 Buyers

Buyers and purchasing agents buy goods and services for use or resale on behalf of industrial, commercial, government or other establishments and organisations.

3324 Trade Brokers

Trade brokers buy and sell commodities and shipping services, usually in bulk, on behalf of their own company or for customers on a commission basis.

3331 Clearing and Forwarding Agents

Shipping, clearing and forwarding agents carry out customs clearing procedures and ensure that insurance, export/import licenses and other formalities are in order.

3332 Conference and Event Planners

Conference and event planners organise and coordinate services for conferences, events, functions, banquets and seminars.

3333 Employment Agents and Contractors

Employment agents and contractors match jobseekers with vacancies, find workers for employers and contract labour for particular projects at the request of enterprises and other organisations, including government institutions, or find places for jobseekers for a commission.

3334 Real Estate Agents and Property Managers

Real estate agents arrange the sale, purchase, rental and lease of real property, usually on behalf of clients and a commission basis.

3339 Business Services Agents Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers business services agents not classified elsewhere in 'Business services agents. For instance, those who establish business contacts, sell business services such as advertising space in the media, arrange contracts for performances of athletes, entertainers and artists, as well as for the publication of books, the production of plays, or the recording, performing and sale of music are classified here. Also included are those selling objects, properties and goods by auction.

3341 Office Supervisors

Office supervisors supervise and coordinate the activities of workers in major group 4: clerical support workers.

3342 Legal Secretaries

Legal secretaries apply specialised knowledge of legal terminology and procedures in providing support to legal professionals with communication, documentation and internal managerial coordination activities in law offices and legal departments of large firms and governments.

3343 Administrative and Executive Secretaries

Administrative and executive secretaries perform liaison, coordination and all tasks in support of managers and professionals and/or prepare correspondence, reports and records of proceedings and other specialised documentation.

3344 Medical Secretaries


Medical secretaries, using specialised knowledge of medical terminology and health care delivery procedures, assist health professionals and other workers by performing a variety of communication, documentation, administrative and internal coordination functions to support health workers in medical facilities and other health care related s.

3351 Customs and Border Inspectors

Customs and immigration officers check persons, vehicles and goods crossing national borders to administer and enforce relevant government rules and regulations.

3352 Government Tax and Excise Officials

Government tax and excise officials examine tax returns, bills of sale and



other documents to determine the type and amount of taxes, duties, and other types of fees to be paid by individuals or businesses, referring cases to accountants, senior government officials or managers.

3353 Government Social Benefits Officials

Government social benefits officials examine applications for government, financial or service programmes to determine eligibility and amount to benefit or appropriate services, referring exceptional or important cases to senior government officials or managers.

3354 Government Licensing Officials

Government licensing officials examine applications for licenses to export or import goods, set up businesses, build houses or other structures, or obtain passports, determine the eligibility of applications for issuing licenses or passports and identify specific conditions or restrictions to be attached to licenses to senior government officials or managers.

3359 Government Regulatory Associate Professionals Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers government associate professionals not elsewhere classified as 'Government associate professionals.

3411 Legal and Related Associate Professionals

Legal associate professionals perform support functions in courts of law or law offices, provide services related to such legal matters as insurance contracts, intellectual property, the transferring of property and the granting of loans and other financial transactions or conduct investigations for clients.

3412 Social Work Associate Professionals

Social work associate professionals administer and implement social assistance programmes and community services and assist clients in dealing with personal and social problems.

3413 Religious Associate Professionals

Religious associate professionals provide support to ministers of religion or a religious community, undertake religious works, preach and propagate the teachings of a particular religion and endeavour to improve well-being through the power of faith and spiritual advice.

3421 Athletes and Sports Player

Athletes and sportsmen participate in competitive sporting events. They train to compete, either individually or as part of a team, in their chosen sport.

3422 Sports Coaches, Instructors and Officials

Sports coaches, instructors and officials work with amateur and professional sportspersons to enhance performance, encourage greater participation in sports, and organise and officiate sporting events according to established rules.

3423 Fitness and Recreation Instructors and Programme Leaders


Fitness and recreation instructors and programme leaders lead, guide and instruct groups and individuals in recreational, fitness or outdoor adventure activities.

3431 Photographers

Photographers operate still cameras to photograph people, events, scenes, materials, products and other subjects.

3432 Interior Designers and Decorators

Interior designers and decorators plan and design commercial, industrial, public,



retail and residential building interiors and surrounding landscapes to produce an environment tailored to a purpose, taking into consideration factors that enhance living and working environments and sales promotion. They coordinate and participate in their construction and decoration.

3433 Gallery, Museum and Library Technicians

Gallery, museum and library technicians prepare artworks, specimens and artefacts for collections, arrange and construct gallery exhibits, and assist librarians to organise and operate systems for handling recorded material and files.

3434 Chefs

Chefs design menus, create dishes and oversee the planning, organisation, preparation and cooking of meals in hotels, restaurants and other eating places, on board ships, on passenger trains and in private households.

3435 Other Artistic and Cultural Associate Professionals

This unit group covers artistic and cultural associate professionals not classified elsewhere in 'Artistic and cultural associate professionals'. For instance, people who assist directors or actors with staging of motion picture, television or commercial productions are classified here.

3511 Information and Communications Technology Operations Technicians

Information and Communications technology operation technicians support the day-to-day processing, operation and monitoring of information and communications technology systems, including local and wide area networks

(LANs and WANs), and hardware, software and related computer equipment to ensure optimal performance and identify any problems.

3512 Information and Communications Technology User Support Technicians

Information and communication technology user support technicians provide technical assistance to users, either directly or by telephone, e-mail or other electronic means, including diagnosing and resolving issues and problems with software, hardware, computer peripheral equipment, networks, databases and the Internet, and providing guidance and support in the deployment, installation and maintenance of systems.

3513 Computer Network and Systems Technicians

Computer network and systems technicians establish, operate and maintain network and other data communications systems.

3514 Web Technicians


Website administrators maintain, monitor and support the optimal functioning of internet and intranet website and web server hardware and software.

3521 Broadcasting Technicians and Audio-Visual Operators

Broadcasting and audio-visual technicians control the technical functioning of equipment to record and edit images and sound and for transmitting radio and television broadcasts of images and sounds.

3522 Telecommunications Engineering Technicians

Telecommunications engineering technicians perform technical tasks



connected with telecommunications engineering research, as well as with the design, manufacture, assembly, construction, operation, maintenance and repair of telecommunications systems.

4110 General Office Clerks

General office clerks perform a wide range of general duties, mostly connected with the keeping of office records and routine aspects of legal matters and personnel records.

4120 Secretaries (general)

Secretaries and verbatim reporters use typewriters, personal computers or other word-processing equipment to transcribe correspondence and other official committees and meetings, check and format documents prepared by other staff, deal with incoming and outgoing mail, screen requests for meetings or appointments and perform a variety of administrative support tasks.

4131 Typists and Word Processing Operators

Typists and word processing operators input and process text and data; prepare, edit and generate documents for storage, processing, publication and transmission.

4132 Data Entry Clerks

Data entry clerks enter coded, statistical, financial and other numerical data into electronic equipment, computerised databases, spreadsheets or other data repositories using a keyboard, mouse, optical scanner, speech recognition software or other data entry tools. They enter data into mechanical and electronic devices to perform mathematical calculations.

4211 Bank Tellers and Related Clerks

Bank tellers and other counter clerks deal directly with clients of banks or post offices in connection with receiving, changing and paying out money or providing mail services.

4212 Bookmakers, Croupiers and Related Gaming Workers

Bookmakers, croupiers and related gaming workers determine odds and receive and pay off bets on results of sporting or other events or conduct games of chance in gambling establishments.

4213 Pawnbrokers and Money-lenders

Pawnbrokers and moneylenders lend money against articles deposited as pledges or against property or other security.

4214 Debt Collectors and Related Workers

Bill collectors and related workers collect payments on overdue accounts and bad cheques and collect charity payments.

4221 Travel Consultants and Clerks

Travel agencies and related clerks supply information, arrange travel itineraries, obtain travel and accommodation reservations and organise group tours.

4222 Contact Centre Information Clerks

Contact centre information clerks provide advice and information to clients, respond to queries regarding a company's goods, services or policies, and process financial transactions using the telephone or electronic communications media such as email. They are located in premises that may be remote from clients or other operations of the s or companies about whom information is provided.

4223 Telephone Switchboard Operators

Telephone operators operate telephone communications switchboards and consoles to establish telephone connections, receive caller inquiries and service problem reports, and record and relay messages to staff or clients.

4224 Hotel Receptionists

Hotel receptionists welcome and register guests in hotels and other establishments that provide accommodation services. They assign rooms, issue keys, provide information concerning the services provided, make room reservations, keep a record of rooms available for occupancy, present statements of charges to departing guests and receive payment.

4225 Inquiry Clerks

Inquiry clerks respond to personal, written and electronic mail as well as telephone inquiries and complaints about the organisation's goods, services and policies, provide information and refer people to other sources. They are employed in locations which put them in direct contact with clients or with the production of the goods and services provided.

4226 Receptionists (general)

Receptionists (general) receive and welcome visitors, clients or guests; respond to inquiries and requests, including arranging for appointments.

4227 Survey and Market Research Interviewers

Survey and Market Research Interviewers interview people and record their responses to survey and market research questions on a range of topics.

4229 Client Information Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group includes client information workers not included elsewhere in 'Client information Workers'. For instance, it includes workers who obtain and process information from clients needed to determine eligibility for services.

4311 Accounting and Bookkeeping Clerks

Accounting and bookkeeping clerks compute, classify, and record numerical data to keep financial records complete. They perform any combination of routine calculating, posting, and verifying duties to obtain primary financial data for use in maintaining accounting records.

4312 Statistical, Financial and Insurance Clerks

Finance and insurance clerks perform clerical tasks relating to the transactions of insurance establishments, banks and other financial establishments.

4313 Payroll Clerks


Payroll clerks compile and maintain payroll records, calculate wages, and prepare payments for employees. They ensure accurate and timely processing of payroll, compliance with regulations, and handle payroll-related inquiries.

4321 Stock Clerks

Stock clerks maintain records of goods produced and production materials received, weighed, issued, dispatched or put into stock.

4322 Production Clerks

Production clerks compute quantities of materials required at specified dates for manufacturing, construction and similar



production programmes and prepare and check production operation schedules.

4432 Transport Clerks

Transport clerks keep records of operational aspects and coordinate the timing of train, road, sea and air passenger and freight transport and prepare reports for management.

4411 Library Clerks

Library clerks issue and receive library materials, sort and shelve books, sound and vision recordings, periodicals, journals, magazines and newspapers and provide general library information to library users.

4412 Mail Carriers and Sorting Clerks

Mail carriers and sorting clerks perform sorting, recording, delivery and other duties in connection with mail services from post offices or related organisations, as well as from or within an establishment.

4413 Coding, Proofreading and Related Clerks

Coding, proofreading and related clerks convert information into codes, verify and correct proofs, and perform several miscellaneous clerical duties.

4414 Scribes and Related Workers

Scribes and related workers write letters and complete forms on behalf of persons who are unable to read and write.

4415 Filing and Copying Clerks

These clerks manage and organise documents, files, and records. They perform tasks such as filing, copying, scanning, and retrieving documents to support administrative operations.

4416 Personnel Clerks

Personnel Clerks maintain and update personnel records such as information on transfers and promotions, performance evaluations, employee leave taken and accumulated, salaries, qualifications and training.

4419 Clerical Support Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers clerical support workers not classified elsewhere in 'Clerical support workers. For instance, the group includes proofreaders, correspondence clerks, press clippers and publication clerks.

5111 Travel Attendants and Stewards

Travel attendants and stewards ensure the comfort and safety of passengers, serve meals and beverages and render personal services, usually on aircraft.

5112 Transport Conductors

Transport conductors check and issue tickets and ensure the safety and comfort of passengers on trains, trams, buses and other public transport vehicles.

5113 Travel Guides

Tour and other guides accompany individuals or groups on trips, sightseeing tours and excursions and tours of places of interest such as historical sites, industrial establishments and theme parks. They describe points of interest and provide background information on interesting features.

5120 Cooks

Cooks plan, organise, prepare and cook meals, according to recipes or under the supervision of chefs, in hotels, restaurants and other eating places.

5131 Waiters

Waiters serve food and beverages in commercial dining and drinking places, clubs, institutions and canteens.

5132 Bartenders and Baristas

Bartenders prepare, mix and serve alcoholic and non-alcoholic drinks, including coffee-based drinks, directly to customers over a bar or counter or through waiters.

5141 Hairdressers

Hairdressers cut, style, colour, straighten and permanently wave hair, shave or trim facial hair and treat scalp conditions.

5142 Beauticians and Related Workers

Beauticians and related workers give facial and body beauty treatments, apply cosmetics and make-up and give other kinds of treatment to individuals to improve their appearance.

5151 Cleaning and Housekeeping Supervisors in Offices, Hotels and Other Establishments

Cleaning and housekeeping supervisors in offices, hotels, and other establishments organise, supervise and carry out housekeeping functions to keep clean and tidy the interiors, fixtures and facilities in these establishments.

5152 Domestic Housekeepers

Domestic housekeepers organise, supervise and carry out housekeeping functions in private households and small accommodation establishments with or without the support of subordinate staff.

5153 Building Caretakers

Building Caretakers take care of apartment houses, hotels, offices and other buildings and maintain the associated grounds in a clean and orderly condition. They may

supervise other workers and contractors depending on the size and nature of the building concerned.

5161 Astrologers, Fortune-tellers and Related Workers

Astrologers, fortune-tellers and related workers recount past and predict future events in persons' lives by practising astrology based on characteristics of the client's palms or other techniques.

5162 Companions and Valets

Companions and valets provide companionship and attend to the various needs of the client or employer.

5163 Undertakers and Embalmers

Undertakers and embalmers perform various tasks in the disposal of dead human bodies.

5164 Pet Groomers, Animal Care Workers

Pet groomers, animal keepers, and trainers feed, handle, train and groom animals and assist veterinarians, animal health technologists and technicians in veterinary facilities, animal shelters, breeding, laboratories, and similar establishments.

5165 Driving Instructors

Driving instructors teach people how to drive motor vehicles.

5169 Personal Service Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers personal service workers not classified elsewhere in 'Personal service workers. For instance, social escorts are classified here.

5211 Stall and Market Salespersons

Stall and market salespersons sell various goods from stalls on open-air or covered markets or stalls in streets or other open spaces.

5212 Street Food Salespersons

Street food salespersons prepare and sell, or sell, previously prepared, hot or cold food and beverages ready for immediate consumption in streets and public places such as stations, cinemas or theatres.

5221 Shopkeepers

Shopkeepers operate small retail shops either independently or with support from a small number of others.

5222 Shop Supervisors

Shop supervisors supervise and coordinate the activities of shop sales assistants, checkout operators and other workers in retail and wholesale shops such as supermarkets and department stores.

5223 Shop Sales Assistants

Shop sales assistants sell a range of goods and services directly to the public or on behalf of retail and wholesale establishments and explain the functions and qualities of these goods and services.

5230 Cashiers and Ticket Clerks

Cashiers and ticket clerks operate cash registers, optical price scanners, computers or other equipment to record and accept payment for the purchase of goods, services and admissions in settings such as stores, restaurants and ticket offices.

5241 Fashion and Other Models

Fashion and other models wear and display clothing and accessories and pose for photographs, film and video, advertising, still photography or artistic creation.

5242 Sales Demonstrators

Sales demonstrators demonstrate goods at commercial premises, exhibitions and private homes.

5243 Door-to-Door Salespersons

Door-to-door salespersons describe, demonstrate and sell goods and services and solicit business for an establishment by approaching or visiting potential customers, usually residents in private homes, by going from door to door.

5244 Contact Centre Salespersons

Contact centre salespersons contact existing and prospective customers using the telephone or other electronic communications media to promote goods and services, obtain sales and arrange sales visits. They may work from a customer contact centre or non-centralised premises.

5245 Service Station Attendants

Service station attendants sell fuel, lubricants and other automotive products and provide services such as fuelling, cleaning, lubricating and performing minor repairs to motor vehicles.

5246 Food Service Counter Attendants

Food service counter attendants serve customers at food counters and finish preparation of simple food items in restaurants, cafes, hotels, fast food outlets, cafeterias and other settings.

5249 Sales Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group includes sales workers not classified elsewhere in 'Sales workers'.

5311 Child Care Workers

Childcare workers provide care and supervision for children and youths in residential homes and in before-school, after-school, vacation and daycare centres.

5312 Teachers' Aides

Teachers' aides perform non-teaching duties to assist teaching staff and provide care and supervision for children in schools and pre-schools.

5321 Healthcare Assistants

Healthcare assistants provide direct personal care and assistance with activities of daily living to patients and residents in a variety of healthcare settings, such as hospitals, clinics, and residential nursing care facilities. They generally work in the implementation of established care plans and practices and under the direct supervision of medical, nursing or other health professionals or associate professionals.

5322 Home-based Personal Care Workers

Home-based personal care workers provide routine personal care and assistance with activities of daily living to persons who need such care due to effects of ageing, illness, injury or other physical or mental conditions in private homes and other independent residential settings.

5329 Personal Care Workers in Health Services Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers providers of routine health and personal care support not classified elsewhere in 'Personal Care Workers in Health Services'. For instance, the group includes occupations such as dental aide, sterilisation aide, hospital orderly, medical imaging assistant and pharmacy aide.

5411 Firefighters

Firefighters respond to emergencies, including fires, accidents, and natural disasters. They rescue individuals, provide

first aid, and work to prevent and extinguish fires, ensuring public safety.

5412 Police Officers

Police officers maintain law and order, patrol public areas, enforce laws, and arrest suspected offenders. They respond to emergencies, protect people and property, and investigate crimes.

5413 Security Guards

Security guards patrol or monitor premises to guard property against theft and vandalism. They control access to establishments, maintain order and enforce regulations at public events and within establishments.

5419 Protective Services and Related Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers protective services workers not classified elsewhere in 'Protective services workers. For instance, the group includes lifeguards, crossing guards and animal control officers.

6111 Field Crop and Vegetable Growers

Field crop and vegetable growers plan, organise and perform farming operations to grow and harvest various types of field crops such as wheat and other cereals, rice, beetroot, sugarcane, groundnuts, reed or other field crops and potatoes, cabbages or other field vegetables for sale or delivery regularly to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at markets.

6112 Tree and Shrub Crop Growers

Tree and shrub crop growers plan, organise and perform farming operations to grow and harvest trees and shrubs such as fruit and nut trees, tea and coffee bushes and to collect sap for sale or delivery regularly to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at markets.

6113 Gardeners, Horticultural and Nursery Growers

Gardeners, horticultural and nursery farm workers perform operations to cultivate and maintain trees, shrubs, flowers and other plants in parks and private gardens and to produce saplings, bulbs and seeds or grow vegetables and flowers by intensive cultivation techniques for sale or delivery regularly to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at markets.

6114 Mixed Crop Growers

Mixed crop growers plan, organise and perform farming operations to grow and harvest specific combinations of field crops, field vegetables, trees and shrub crops, and garden, horticultural and nursery products for sale or delivery to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at market.

6121 Livestock and Dairy Producers

Livestock and dairy farm workers perform farming operations to breed and raise domesticated animals (excluding poultry), such as cattle, sheep, pigs, goats and yaks, for the production of meat, milk and other dairy products and wool for sale or delivery to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at markets.

6122 Poultry Producers

Poultry producers plan, organise and perform farming operations to breed and raise chickens and to produce eggs and breeding stock for sale or delivery to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or markets.

6123 Apiarists and Sericulturists

Apiarists and Sericulturists plan, organise and perform farming operations to breed, raise and tend insects such as honey bees and other species to produce honey,

beeswax, silk and other products for sale or delivery to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or markets.

6129 Animal Producers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers market-oriented animal producers not classified elsewhere in 'Animal producers'. For instance, the group includes those engaged in breeding, raising and tending non-domesticated mammals and other birds (except poultry and other reptiles, as well as various insects and animals used for laboratory tests, for sale or delivery regularly to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at the market.

6130 Mixed Crop and Animal Producers

Mixed crop growers plan, organise and perform farming operations to grow and harvest fields, trees and various other crops, as well as to breed, raise and tend animals and to produce a variety of animal husbandry products for sale or delivery to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or at markets.

6210 Forestry and Related Workers


Forestry and related workers plan, organise and perform operations to cultivate, conserve and exploit natural and plantation forests.

6221 Aquaculture Workers

Aquaculture workers breed and raise fish for sale or delivery regularly to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or markets.

6222 Inland and Coastal Waters Fishery Workers

Inland water fishery workers, alone or as members of fishing-vessel crews, catch



fish inland for sale or delivery regularly to wholesale buyers, marketing organisations or markets.

6224 Hunters and Trappers

Hunters and trappers capture and kill wild animals for food, fur, or pest control. They use various methods and equipment to track, trap, and hunt animals in compliance with regulations.

6310 Subsistence Crop Farmers

Subsistence crop farmers grow and harvest field or tree and shrub crops, vegetables and fruit to provide food, shelter and, in some cases, a minimum of cash income for themselves and their households.

6320 Subsistence Livestock Farmers

Subsistence livestock farmers breed, raise and tend livestock to provide food, shelter, and, in some cases, a minimum of cash income for themselves and their households.

6330 Subsistence Mixed Crop and Livestock Farmers

Subsistence mixed crop and livestock farmers grow and harvest field or trees and shrub crops, vegetables and fruit; gather wild fruits and medicinal and other plants; tend or hunt animals; and/or catch fish and gather various forms of aquatic life to provide food, shelter and in some cases, a minimum of cash income for themselves and their households;

6340 Subsistence Fishers, Hunters, Trappers and Gatherers

Subsistence gatherers gather wild fruits and medicinal and other plants to earn cash income for themselves and their households.

7111 House Builders

House builders erect, maintain and repair houses and similar small buildings using either traditional or modern techniques or materials.

7112 Bricklayers and Related Workers

Bricklayers and related workers lay bricks, pre-cut stones and other types of building stones in mortar to construct and repair walls, partitions, arches and other structures.

7113 Stonemasons, Stone Cutters, Splitters and Carvers

Stone cutters, splitters, carvers and stonemasons cut and shape hard and soft stone blocks and slabs for the construction and maintenance of stone structures and monumental masonry and carve designs and figures in stones.

7114 Concrete Placers, Concrete Finishers and Related Workers


Concrete placers, concrete finishers and related workers erect reinforced concrete frameworks and structures, make forms for moulding concrete, reinforce concrete surfaces, cement openings in walls or casing for wells, finish and repair cement surfaces and carry out terrazzo work.

7115 Carpenters and Joiners

Carpenters and joiners cut, shape, assemble, erect, maintain and repair various types of structures and fittings made from wood and other materials.

7119 Building and Related Trades Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers building frame and related trades, workers not elsewhere classified in 'Building frame and related trades workers. For example, the group



includes steeplejacks, scaffolders and demolition workers.

7121 Roofers

Roofers build and repair roofs on all types of buildings using one or more kinds of materials.

7122 Floor Layers and Tile Setters

Floor layers and tile setters install, maintain and repair flooring and cover floors, walls and other surfaces with tiles or mosaic panels for decorative or other purposes.

7123 Plasterers

Plasterers install, maintain and repair plasterboard in buildings and apply decorative and protective coverings of plaster, cement and similar material to the interiors and exteriors of structures.

7124 Insulation Workers

Insulation workers apply and repair insulating materials to buildings, boilers, pipes or refrigeration and air-conditioning equipment.

7125 Glaziers

Glaziers measure, cut, finish, fit and install flat glass and mirrors.

7126 Plumbers and Pipe Fitters

Plumbers, pipefitters, and related workers assemble, install, repair and maintain pipe systems, fittings and fixtures for water, drainage, sewage systems, and hydraulic and pneumatic equipment.

7127 Air-Conditioning and Refrigeration Mechanics

Air-conditioning and refrigeration mechanics assemble, install, maintain and repair air-conditioning and refrigeration systems and equipment.

7131 Painters and Related Workers

Building painters and related workers prepare surfaces of buildings and other

structures for painting, apply protective and decorative coats of paint or similar materials, or cover interior walls and ceilings of buildings with wallpaper or other finishes.

7132 Spray Painters and Varnishers

Spray painters, varnishers and other painters operate spray painting and varnishing equipment to apply protective coatings to manufactured items or structures.

7133 Building Structure Cleaners

Building maintenance workers, building structure cleaners and related workers clean the exterior surfaces of buildings and other structures and remove soot from chimneys.

7211 Metal Moulders and Core makers

Metal moulders and core makers make moulds and cores for casting metal.

7212 Welders and Flame Cutters

Welders and flame cutters weld and cut metal parts using gas flame, electric arc and other sources of heat to melt and cut or to melt and fuse metal.

7213 Sheet Metal Workers


Sheet metal workers make, install and repair articles and parts of articles made out of sheet metal such as sheet steel, copper, tin, brass, aluminium, zinc or galvanised iron.

7214 Structural Metal Preparers and Erectors

Structural metal preparers and erectors assemble, erect and dismantle structural metal frames of buildings and other structures.

7215 Riggers and Cable Splicers

Riggers and cable splicers assemble rigging gear to move and position equipment



and structural components or install and maintain cables, ropes and wires on construction sites, buildings or other structures.

7221 Blacksmiths, Hammersmiths and Forging-Press Workers

Blacksmiths, hammersmiths and forging-press workers, hammer and forge bars, rods or ingots of iron, steel and other metals to make and repair various kinds of tools, equipment and other articles, set machine tools for operators or set and operate various machine tools and polish and sharpen surfaces.

7222 Toolmakers and Related Workers

Toolmakers and related workers make and repair custom-made and specialised tools, patterns, machinery components and other metal articles using hand and machine tools to work metal to fine tolerances.

7223 Metal Working Machine Tool Setters and Operators

Metal working machine tool setters and operators set and/or operate various machine tools working to fine tolerances.

7224 Metal Polishers, Wheel Grinders and Tool Sharpeners

Metal polishers, wheel grinders and tool sharpeners polish and grind metal surfaces and sharpen tools.

7231 Motor Vehicle Mechanics and Repairers

Motor vehicle mechanics and repairers fit, install, maintain, service and repair engines and the mechanical and related equipment of passenger cars, delivery trucks, motorcycles and other motor vehicles.

7232 Aircraft Engine Mechanics and Repairers

Aircraft engine mechanics and repairers fit, service, repair and overhaul aircraft engines and assemblies, such as airframes, hydraulic, and pneumatic systems.

7233 Agricultural and Industrial Machinery Mechanics and Repairers

Agricultural and industrial machinery mechanics and repairers fit, install, examine, service and repair engines, agricultural and industrial machinery and mechanical equipment, except motor vehicles, aircraft and electric motors.

7234 Bicycle and Related Repairers

Bicycle and related repairers fit, maintain, service and repair the mechanical and related equipment of bicycles, wheelchairs and similar non-motorized transport equipment.

7311 Precision-Instrument Makers and Repairers

Precision instrument makers and repairers make, calibrate, repair, maintain, adjust and install mechanical watches, clocks, nautical, meteorological, optical, orthopaedic and other precision instruments and equipment and set them for correct performance.

7312 Musical Instrument Makers and Tuners

Musical instrument makers, repairers and tuners make, assemble, repair, adjust, and restore musical instruments and tune them to the required pitch with hand or power tools. They usually specialise in one type of instrument, such as string instruments, brass instruments, pianos, reed instruments or percussion instruments.

7313 Jewellery and Precious Metal Workers

Jewellery and precious metal workers design, fabricate, adjust, repair, or appraise jewellery, ceremonial or religious items, gold, silver, or other precious metals or gems. They cut, file, polish and set precious and semi-precious stones, including gems and diamonds and engrave designs on jewellery and precious metal articles.

7314 Potters and Related Workers

Potters and related workers prepare pottery, porcelain ware, sanitary ware, bricks, tiles and abrasive wheels by hand or by machine.

7315 Glass Makers, Cutters, Grinders and Finishers

Glassmakers, cutters, grinders and finishers blow, mould, press, cut, trim, grind and polish glass, and shape molten glass according to patterns.

7316 Sign Writers, Decorative Painters, Engravers and Etchers

Signwriters, decorative painters, engravers and etchers decorate articles made of wood, metal, textiles, glass, ceramics and other materials. They plan, layout and paint letters, figures, monograms and designs to make signs and engrave and etch ornamental and floral designs on glass and other articles.

7317 Handicraft Workers in Wood, Basketry and Related Materials

Handicraft workers in wood, basketry and related materials apply traditional techniques such as seasoning or impregnation to prepare wood, straw, rattan, reeds, clay and other materials,

and carve, mould, assembly, weave or paint and decorative various articles for personal or households use or for decorative purposes. Basketry weavers, brush makers, and related workers select and prepare materials such as bristles, nylon, fibre, whiskers and wire to make wicker furniture, brushes and brooms and to weave various kinds of baskets.

7318 Handicraft Workers in Textile, Leather and Related Materials

Handicraft workers in textile, leather and related materials apply traditional techniques and patterns to produce woven fabrics, knitted, embroidered, woven and other garments and articles for household use, as well as traditional footwear, handbags, belts and other accessories.

7319 Handicraft Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers handicraft workers who perform traditional handicrafts not classified elsewhere. For instance, the group includes traditional handicraft workers in non-precious metals and stone.

7321 Pre-Press Technicians

Pre-press trade workers proof, format, set and compose text and graphics into a form suitable for use in various printing processes and representation in other visual media.

7322 Printers

Silk-screen, block and textile printers cut stencils for use in silk-screen printing and print on paper, metal, textiles and other materials with silk screens, blocks of rubber, wood or other materials, or engraved printing rollers.

7322 Print Finishing and Binding Workers

Print finishing and binding workers bind books and other publications and finish printed products by hand or machine.

7411 Building and Related Electricians

Building and related electricians install, maintain and repair electrical wiring systems and related equipment and fixtures.

7412 Electrical Mechanics and Fitters

Electrical mechanics and fitters fit, adjust, install and repair electrical machinery and other electrical apparatus and equipment in buildings, factories, workshops or other places.

7413 Electrical Line Installers and Repairers

Electrical line installers and repairers install, repair and join electrical transmission and supply cables and related equipment.

7421 Electronics Mechanics and Services

Electronics mechanics and servicers fit, maintain, adjust and repair electronic equipment such as commercial and office machines and electronic instruments and control systems.

7422 Information and Communications Technology Installers and Servicers

Information and communications technology (ICT) installers and servicers install, repair and maintain telecommunications equipment, data transmission equipment, cables, antennae and conduits and repair, fit and maintain computers.

7511 Butchers, Fishmongers and Related Food Preparers

Fishmongers and related food preparers clean, cut and dress meat and fish, remove bones and prepare related food items

or preserve meat, fish and other foods and food products by drying, salting or smoking.

7512 Bakers, Pastry-cooks and Confectionery Makers

Bakers, pastry cooks and confectionery makers make various kinds of bread, cakes, and other flour products, as well as handmade chocolate and sugar confectionery.

7513 Dairy Products Makers

Dairy product makers process butter and various types of cheese, cream or other dairy products.

7514 Fruits, Vegetables and Related Preservers

Fruit, vegetables and related preservers process or preserve fruit, nuts and related foods in various ways, including cooking, drying and salting, or juice or oil extraction.

7515 Food and Beverage Tasters and Graders

Food and beverage tasters and graders inspect, taste and grade various types of agricultural products, food and beverages.

7516 Tobacco Preparers and Tobacco Products Makers

These workers prepare raw tobacco and manufacture tobacco products such as cigarettes and cigars. They process, blend, and package tobacco to meet quality standards.

7521 Wood Treaters

Wood treaters season, preserve and treat wood and lumber manually or using wood treatment equipment such as kilns and tanks.

7522 Cabinet-makers and Related Workers

Cabinet makers and related workers make, decorate and repair wooden furniture, parts, fittings, patterns, models and other wooden products using woodworking machines, machine tools and specialised hand tools.

7523 Woodworking Machine Tool Setters and Operators

Woodworking machine tool setters and operators set up, operate and monitor automatic or semi-automatic woodworking machines such as precision sawing, shaping, planning, boring, turning and woodcarving machines to fabricate or repair wooden parts for furniture, fixtures and other wooden products.

7531 Tailors, Dressmakers, Furriers and Hatters

Tailors and dressmakers fabricate, fit, alter and repair tailored or hand-made clothing. They produce made-to-measure clothing, such as suits, overcoats, and dresses from textile fabrics and other materials, according to customers' and clothing manufacturers' specifications.

7532 Garment and Related Pattern-Makers and Cutters

Textile, leather and related patternmakers and cutters create precision master patterns for the production of garments, other textiles, and leather or fur products. They mark, cut, shape and trim textile, light leather and other materials according to blueprints or specifications in the manufacture of garments, hats and caps, gloves and miscellaneous products.

7533 Sewing, Embroidery and Related Workers

Sewing, embroidery, and related workers sew together, repair, renovate and decorate garments, gloves and other products of textile, fur, light leather and other materials and fabricated tents, awnings and tarpaulins. They work mainly by hand, using a needle and thread, but may perform some tasks using a sewing machine.

7534 Upholsterers and Related Workers

Upholsterers and related workers install, repair and replace upholstery of furniture, fixtures, orthopaedic appliances; seats, panels, convertible and vinyl tops and other furnishings of automobile's aircraft and similar items with fabric, leather, rexine or other upholstery material. They also make and repair cushions, quilts and mattresses.

7535 Pelt Dressers, Tanners and Fellmongers

These professionals process animal hides and pelts to produce leather and fur products. They treat, tan, and finish hides to create materials for clothing, accessories, and other goods.

7536 Shoemakers and Related Workers

Shoemakers and related workers make, modify and repair standard, custom or orthopaedic footwear and natural or synthetic leather articles, such as luggage, handbags and belts (except for leather garments, hats and gloves), or participate in the manufacture of shoes and related goods. They decorate, reinforce or finish shoes, luggage, handbags and belts.

7541 Underwater Divers

Underwater divers perform tasks such as inspection, repair, and construction underwater. They may work in various environments, including oceans, lakes, and rivers, using specialised diving equipment.

7542 Shotfirers and Blasters

Shotfirers and blasters position, assemble and detonate explosives at mining, quarrying and demolition sites.

7543 Product Graders and Testers (excluding Foods and Beverages)

Product graders and testers (excluding food and beverages) inspect, test, sort, sample and weigh raw materials, manufactured components and non-comestible goods produced or sold to ensure compliance with quality standards, to identify defects, wear and deviations from specifications, and to grade and classify them according to their quality.

7544 Fumigators and Other Pest and Weed Controllers

These workers apply chemicals and other methods to control pests and weeds. They inspect areas, identify infestations, and implement treatment plans to eliminate unwanted organisms.

7549 Craft and Related Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This group covers craft and trade occupations not classified elsewhere in 'Craft and Related Workers Not Elsewhere Classified'. For instance, the group includes those who mould, slice, grind and polish optical lenses and those who arrange flowers for display'

8111 Miners and Quarriers

Miners and quarries operate plants, machinery and hand tools to extract rocks, minerals, ores and other deposits from underground and surface mines and quarries.

8112 Mineral and Stone Processing Plant Operators

Mineral and stone processing plant operators, monitor and operate machinery and equipment for processing rocks, minerals and stone to recover refined products for immediate use or further processing.

8113 Well Drillers and Borers and Other Mining Related Workers

Well, drillers, borers, and other mining-related workers operate, assemble and monitor machines for cutting channels in the mining workforce or for the drilling and sinking of wells, extracting ore, liquids and gases or for a variety of other purposes.

8114 Cement, Stone and Other Mineral Products Machine Operators


These operators control machinery used in the production of cement, stone, and other mineral products. They ensure the efficient and safe operation of equipment and monitor production processes.

8121 Metal Processing Plant Operators

Metal processing plant operators monitor, operate, adjust and maintain single-function process machinery and equipment to process and convert mineral ores and refine, harden, roll and extrude metals.

8122 Metal Finishing, Plating and Coating Machine Operators

Metal finishing, plating and coating machine operators monitor and operate



equipment which finishes, plates and coats metal articles or parts to give them improved resistance to corrosion and abrasion, for decorative purposes, or to impart electrical or magnetic properties.

8131 Chemical Products Plant and Machine Operators

Chemical products plant and machine operators monitor and operate chemical plants, units and machinery and adjust and maintain processing units and equipment that distil, filter, separate, heat or refine chemicals to blend, mix, process and package a wide range of chemical products.

8132 Photographic Products Machine Operators

Photographic products machine operators operate and monitor equipment which makes photographic film and paper and which processes exposed photographic film and makes prints.

8141 Rubber Products Machine Operators

Rubber products machine operators monitor and operate machines which knead and blend rubber and rubber compounds to produce various components and products from natural and synthetic rubber, such as moulded footwear, domestic articles, insulating materials, industrial accessories or tyres.

8142 Plastic Products Machine Operators

Plastic products machine operators monitor and operate machines which knead and blend compounds to obtain plastic materials, which make various plastic components and articles.

8143 Paper Products Machine Operators

Paper products machine operators monitor and operate machines which produce

boxes, envelopes, bags and other goods from paper, paperboard and other similar materials.

8151 Fibre Preparing, Spinning and Winding Machine Operators

These operators manage machines that prepare, spin, and wind fibres into yarn or thread. They monitor machinery, adjust settings, and ensure the quality of the final product.

8152 Weaving and Knitting Machine Operators

These operators control machines that weave and knit textiles. They set up, operate, and maintain equipment to produce fabrics and garments according to specifications.

8153 Sewing Machine Operators

Sewing machine operators operate and monitor sewing machines to make, repair, darn and renovate textile, fur, synthetic or leather garments or embroider ornamental designs on garments or other materials. They operate button hole-making and eyelet-holing machines to cut holes, stitch around holes, stitch buttons and fix eyelets to garments.

8154 Bleaching, Dyeing and Fabric Cleaning Machine Operators

These operators handle machines that bleach, dye, and clean fabrics. They ensure the proper treatment of textiles to achieve desired colours and finishes.

8155 Fur and Leather Preparing Machine Operators

These operators manage machines that prepare fur and leather materials. They process hides and pelts, ensuring they meet quality standards for further manufacturing.

8156 Shoemaking and Related Machine Operators

Shoemaking and related machine operators monitor and operate machines which produce and repair standard or special footwear and other accessories.

8157 Laundry Machine Operators

Laundry machine operators operate laundry, dry-cleaning, pressing and fabric treatment machines in laundries and dry-cleaning establishments.

8159 Textile, Fur and Leather Products Machine Operators Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group includes laundry and dry-cleaning machine operators and operators of machines that produce textile, fur and leather products not elsewhere classified in 'Textile, fur and leather products machine operators.

8160 Food and Related Products Machine Operators

Food and related products machine operators set, operate and attend machinery used to bake, freeze, heat, crush, mix, blend and otherwise process foodstuffs and beverages.

8171 Pulp and Papermaking Plant Operators

Pulp and papermaking plant operators operate and monitor multi-function process control machinery and processing equipment to control the processing of wood, scrap pulp and other cellulose materials in the production of pulp.

8172 Wood Processing Plant Operators

Wood processing plant operators monitor, operate and control automated lumber mill equipment for sawing timber logs

into rough lumber, cutting veneer, making plywood and particle board and otherwise preparing wood for further use.

8181 Glass and Ceramics Plant Operators

Glass and ceramic plant operators monitor and operate kilns, furnaces and other machinery and equipment used in the manufacture of glass, ceramics, porcelain, tiles or bricks. They operate machines to anneal, harden or decorate glass and ceramics.

8182 Steam Engine and Boiler Operators

These operators manage steam engines and boilers, ensuring they operate efficiently and safely. They monitor pressure, temperature, and other parameters, performing maintenance as needed.

8183 Packing, Bottling and Labelling Machine Operators

Packing, bottling and labelling machine operators monitor and operate machines which weigh, pack and label various products or fill different containers with products.

8189 Stationary Plant and Machine Operators Not Elsewhere Classified


Stationary plant and machine operators not elsewhere classified include other operators not classified in 'Other stationary plant and machine operators.

8211 Mechanical Machinery Assemblers

Mechanical machinery assemblers assemble, according to procedures strictly laid down, parts of mechanical machinery such as engines, motors and turbines.

8212 Electrical and Electronic Equipment Assemblers

Electrical and electronic equipment assemblers assemble or modify, according



to strictly laid down procedures, components of electrical, electro-mechanical and electronic equipment.

8219 Assemblers Not Elsewhere Classified
Assemblers not elsewhere classified assemble, according to strictly laid down procedures, various products that do not include electronic or electrical components.

8311 Locomotive Engine Drivers
Locomotive engine drivers operate trains, ensuring safe and timely transportation of passengers and goods. They follow schedules, signals, and safety protocols while driving trains.

8312 Railway Brake, Signal and Switch Operators

These operators manage railway braking systems, signals, and switches. They ensure the safe movement of trains by controlling track switches and signalling equipment.

8321 Motorcycle Drivers
Motorcycle (including motorised personal mobility devices) delivery men drive and tend motorcycles or motorised personal mobility devices to transport materials and goods, including non-mail items such as food and beverages.

8322 Car, Taxi and Van and Drivers
Car, taxi and van drivers drive and tend motor cars and vans to transport passengers, materials or goods, including non-mail items such as food and beverages.

8331 Bus and Tram Drivers
Bus and Tram drivers drive and tend buses to transport passengers or goods.

8332 Heavy Truck and Lorry Drivers
Heavy truck and lorry drivers drive and tend heavy motor vehicles to transport

goods, liquids and heavy materials over short or long distances.

8341 Mobile Farm and Forestry Plant Operators

Mobile farm and forestry plant operators drive, tend, operate and monitor one or more types of special-purpose motorised mobile machinery or equipment used in agricultural, horticultural and forestry operations.

8342 Earth Moving and Related Plant Operators

Earthmoving and related machinery operators operate machines to excavate, grade, level, smooth and compact earth or similar materials.

8343 Crane, Hoist and Related Plant Operators

Crane, hoist and related equipment operators monitor and operate stationary and mobile cranes and other hoisting equipment.

8344 Lifting Truck Operators

Lifting truck operators drive, operate and monitor lifting trucks or similar vehicles to transport, lift and stack pallets with goods.

8350 Ships' Deck Crews and Related Workers

These workers assist in the operation and maintenance of ships. They perform tasks such as handling cargo, maintaining the deck, and assisting with navigation and safety procedures.

9111 Domestic Cleaners and Helpers

Domestic cleaners and helpers sweep, vacuum clean, wash and polish, take care of household linen, purchase household supplies, prepare food, serve meals and perform various other domestic duties.

9112 Cleaners and Helpers in offices, Hotels and Related Establishments

Cleaners and helpers in hotels and related establishments perform various cleaning tasks to keep clean and tidy the interiors and fixtures of hotels and related establishments.

9121 Hand Launderers and Pressers

Hand launderers and pressers launder, press or dry-clean garments, linen and other textiles by hand.

9122 Vehicle Cleaners

Vehicle cleaners wash, clean, and polish motor vehicles such as cars and taxis.

9123 Window Cleaners

Window cleaners wash and polish windows and other glass fittings.

9129 Other Cleaning Workers not elsewhere classified.

This group includes other cleaning workers who clean surfaces, materials and objects, such as walls, swimming pools and non-motor vehicles like aircraft, using specialised cleaning equipment and chemicals.

9211 Crop Farm Labourers

Crop farm labourers perform simple and routine tasks on farms in the production of crops such as fruits, nuts, grains and vegetables.

9212 Livestock Farm Labourers

Livestock farm labourers perform simple and routine tasks in farm production of animals, including poultry and insects.

9213 Mixed Crop and Livestock Farm Labourers

Mixed crop and livestock farm labourers perform simple and routine tasks in farm production of both crops and animals.

9214 Garden and Horticultural Labourers

Garden and horticultural labourers perform simple and routine tasks in operations to cultivate and maintain trees, shrubs, flowers and other plants in park and private gardens, to produce saplings, bulbs and seeds, or to grow vegetables and flowers by intensive cultivation techniques.

9215 Forestry Labourers

Forestry labourers perform simple and routine tasks in operations to cultivate and maintain natural and plantation forests, and log fell and saw trees.

9216 Fishery and Aquaculture Labourers

Fishery and aquaculture labourers perform simple and routine tasks to cultivate and harvest fish.

9311 Mining and Quarrying Labourers

Mining and quarrying labourers perform routine tasks in mining and quarrying.

9310 Civil Engineering Labourers

Civil engineering labourers perform routine tasks in connection with the building and maintenance of roads and other civil engineering projects.

9313 Building Construction Labourers

Building construction labourers perform routine tasks in connection with the building and demolition work.

9321 Hand Packers

Hand-packers weigh, pack, and label materials and products by hand.

9329 Manufacturing Labourers Not Elsewhere Classified

Manufacturing labourers not elsewhere classified assist the work of machine operators and assemblers and perform a variety of manual tasks in manufacturing, including packing and labelling finished products.

9331 Hand and Pedal Vehicle Drivers

These drivers operate hand or pedal-powered vehicles, such as rickshaws or bicycles, to transport passengers or goods. They navigate routes and ensure the safe delivery of their cargo.

9332 Drivers of Animal-drawn Vehicles and Machinery

These drivers operate vehicles and machinery drawn by animals, such as carts or ploughs. They manage the animals and ensure the safe and efficient transport of goods or execution of tasks.

9333 Freight Handlers

Material and freight handlers carry out tasks such as packing, carrying, loading and unloading furniture and other household items, loading and unloading aircraft cargoes and other freight, or carrying and stacking goods in various warehouses.

9334 Shelf Fillers

Shelf fillers stock shelves and display areas and keep stock clean and in order in supermarkets and other retail and wholesale shops.

9411 Fast Food Preparers

Fast food preparer prepares and cooks to order a limited range of foods or beverages that involve simple preparation processes and a small number of ingredients. They may take orders from customers and serve at counters or tables.

9412 Kitchen Helpers

Kitchen helpers' clear tables, clean kitchen areas, wash dishes, prepare ingredients and perform other duties to assist workers who prepare or serve food and beverages.

9510 Street and Related Services Workers

Street and related services workers provide various services on streets and in other public places, including cleaning shoes, washing car windows, running errands, handing out leaflets, looking after property, and providing other on-the-spot street services.

9520 Street Vendors (excluding Food)

Street vendors (excluding food) sell a usually limited range of goods (excluding food for immediate consumption) in streets and public places.

9611 Garbage and Recycling Collectors

Garbage collectors collect and remove rubbish items for recycling from buildings, yards, streets and other places.

9612 Refuse Sorters

Refuse sorters identify, collect and sort discarded items suitable for recycling at dump sites and recycling enterprises or in buildings, streets and other public places.

9613 Sweepers and Related Labourers

Sweepers and related labourers sweep and clean streets, parks, airports, stations and other public places.

9621 Messengers, Package Deliverers and Luggage Porters

Messengers, package deliverers, and luggage porters carry and deliver messages, packages and other items on foot, within an establishment or between establishments, to households and elsewhere, or carry luggage, especially at hotels, stations and airports.

9622 Odd-job Persons

Odd-job persons clean, paint and maintain buildings, grounds and facilities and undertake simple repairs.



9623 Meter Readers and Vending-machine Collectors

Meter readers and vending-machine collectors stock vending machines and collect money from them or parking meters and other coin boxes or read electricity, gas or water meters.

9624 Water and Firewood Collectors

Water and firewood collectors collect water and firewood and transport them on foot or using hand.

9629 Elementary Workers Not Elsewhere Classified

This unit group covers elementary workers not classified elsewhere in 'Elementary Occupations'. For instance, this group includes those who issue and collect parking or admission tickets, provide personal items to patrons and assist patrons at entertainment events.
